A New Website for St. John's

If you have visited <u>stjohnsworthington.org</u> in the last couple of weeks, you have noticed that we have a new website! A new home page and online giving page went live in mid-March. More pages will be added as we build out the site in the coming weeks.

All websites have a lifespan, and the vestry and staff have recognized for some time that St. John's website was due for an overhaul. Much of the previous website's content predated Covid, and the technical setup of the site made it difficult to update. A communications audit commissioned by the vestry in 2023 recommended building a new website focused more on images of our community rather than text—the classic "show, don't tell" wisdom. Knowing that we had a new website coming, I engaged Krista DeVaul of Woven Hearts Photography to take pictures of our bishop's visitation last June. Krista, a member of Redeemer Episcopal Church in Cincinnati, is an experienced photographer of worship services, and she took hundreds of stunning photos that capture the joy and light at the heart of St. John's. After researching website vendors, the vestry chose to work with Ministry Brands, which also provides our database software. Their focus on churches, ease of use, functional platforms, affordability, and integration with our database were a good fit for St. John's needs at this time. We concluded our relationship with our previous vendor in March, thanking them for their good work with us over the years.

Church websites have two audiences: visitors seeking to learn about the church and members. St. John's new site strives to reach both. Websites are a key means of sharing the good news of Jesus with those longing to hear it, so the public pages will strive to present a compelling portrait of our parish, inviting visitors in with easy-to-understand language and lots of pictures. A secure member portal will eventually allow easy access to our database, as well as other information specific to members. The entire site is oriented around our mission statement: To grow, heal, and serve with God's wisdom, love, and joy.

I'm grateful to Star Blackford and Bella Olmstead for leading the construction of the website and getting it ready in time for visitors searching for Easter services. Dana Whitley, Mary Bailey, and Lisa Graupmann provided essential input as we worked with the designer. Please check out the new website!

Top 5 Rarely-Used Parts of the Prayer Book



Warden's Corner!

As I write my first warden's column on a chilly afternoon, I reflect on a recent property walkaround led by Ted Dziemianowicz. The purpose of the walk was to share with a small group - Gia, David Talbot, the wardens, and representatives from the Lay Weeders – an "up close" look at the proposed tree and shrub removals identified in a recent diocesan facilities assessment. The crux of the matter, however, was this: some beloved and historical trees must come down. Trees that have been part of St. John's Worthington's landscaping for generations; trees that are beloved for their beauty and history. Yet these same trees now threaten the integrity of our foundation - their roots grow too close, they impede access to gutters, they damage furnace motors. Most notably, one tree was described as "a beautiful tree in the wrong space." But the meeting ended, fittingly, not with talk of the trees we were losing, but the new trees we might plant – where we might put them to enhance and protect our property, and how we might be mindful of choosing species trending just a bit south. How we might choose the right trees for today and the generations to come.

Much of this same work lies ahead of our new Vestry. In the coming months, we must work together to examine our stewardship and committee models with not only an eye to what is impeding our work and growth, but an eye to what will feed our souls, broaden our reach, and better help us grow, heal, and serve with God's wisdom, love, and joy for years to come. As your new Senior Warden, I look forward to learning what that means to each of you. As I grow and deepen existing relationships at the 9 am service, I'll be attending the 11:15 am service once a month to ensure I'm visible to all our parishioners. Likewise, I offer my deepest gratitude to all those who have reached out with offers of support and institutional knowledge – thank you.

Our baptismal vows remind us that all good we do is done "with God's help." I look forward to humbly serving you – with God's help – in the years ahead.

Miriam Utter's Vegan Irish Stew

3 Tbsp olive oil

1 large yellow onion, diced

1 cup sliced carrots

1 cup sliced celery

Salt and pepper to taste

1 lb mushrooms, halved

6 cloves garlic, sliced thin

c 010 / 00 **S**ullito, 01100 th 01111

2 tsp thyme

1 tsp oregano

1 tsp sage

2 Tbsp flour

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar

1 lb potatoes (about 3-4 medium)*cut into 6ths

1 cup split red lentils**

1 15oz can tomato sauce

3-4 cups vegetable broth***

2 bay leaves

1/4 cup parsley leaves for garnish

Heat oil in large pot over medium heat. Add onion, carrot, celery and salt and pepper. Cook 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add mushrooms, garlic, thyme, oregano and sage. Cook 3-4 minutes, stirring frequently. Sprinkle flour over ingredients in pan; cook and stir for 1 minute. Deglaze with balsamic vinegar and soy sauce. Add potatoes, lentils, tomato sauce, broth and bay leaves. Cook until just below boiling over medium high heat, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat; simmer 10 to 15 minutes until potatoes are tender. Season with more salt and pepper if desired, remove bay leaves. Makes about six servings.

*I used red potatoes, unpeeled, but white or yellow will do also.

**red lentils are available at Indian store as masoor dal, or Fresh Thyme in the bulk foods

*** I started with 3 cups broth but added 1 more cup as the stew was too thick and took about 20-25 minutes for potatoes to cook.

Food Pantry

A recent letter from the Worthington Resource Pantry outlined some of the different ways the pantry helps keep hungry neighbors fed and connected to vital resources. The letter said, "Many of our neighbors never dreamed they would need us. But the loss of a job, an illness, or unexpected expenses lead them to our door. Our services are designed to meet our neighbors where they are and address hunger where it hits hardest.

- Open Pantry: Our Pantry is open to the public four days a week for our neighbors to make selections of meat, dairy, dry goods, produce, personal care items, and more.
- Pop Up Pantries: The Pantry brings fresh, healthy food directly to low-income housing communities.
- Homebound Delivery: We help our neighbors overcome obstacles like lack of mobility, transportation, and availability during Open Pantry hours by bringing healthy food directly to their door.
- High School Markets: We set up free grab-and-go snack markets at local high schools to provide students with healthy foods throughout the school day while minimizing stigma.
- Summer Services for Kids: The Pantry supplements Worthington Schools' weekday summer lunch program for elementary schoolers by sending home produce and snacks for them to enjoy over the weekend.

"Food is a basic need for all of us. Your [contributions] make the difference for thousands of neighbors, no matter their circumstance, get fresh, healthy food all year round. Thank you for providing help and hope to our neighbors in need."



Financial Summary:

At the end of February, our pledge contributions were under budget by \$19,700; our other plate contributions (which consist primarily of contributions from non-pledging members and plate cash) were over budget by \$2,500; and in total, our revenues were under budget by \$15,200. In total, our operating expenses were over budget by \$300, which, in combination with our revenues, left us with a positive cash flow of \$38,500, primarily due to the receipt of our very generous matching stewardship gift.



St. John's Endowment Funds Going Green

A portion of the equity position of St. John's Endowment has recently been moved to socially responsible investment funds. Two years ago, the Finance Committee began discussing the idea of investing our endowment accounts in stocks and funds which more closely aligned with the values and concerns of our St. John's community. The questions we posed to our investment advisor, Hamilton Capital, were these: "Can we enjoy a comparable rate of return with a socially responsible portfolio as we now have with our current portfolio? Can we look at funds with a smaller carbon footprint, or funds that do not include alcohol or tobacco or firearms manufacturers? What if we don't want to hold stocks in corporations that own private prisons or coal manufacturers?"

Our advisors at Hamilton did quite a bit of research to answer our questions and identified a firm, Aperio Group, which is a division of Blackrock, Inc., the world's largest asset manager. Aperio and Hamilton worked with us to identify the holdings we deemed unacceptable as well as those we wanted to tilt away from. A new portfolio was created using our existing investment strategy with Hamilton but replacing our funds with those which reflected our values and concerns. Our existing portfolio was modelled against the new one and rates of return, yield and performance were historically compared. The differences were negligible.

Currently, the equity portion of our permanent funds are invested in the new portfolio and, as interest rates decline, we expect the fixed income portion of those permanent funds to be re-allocated to equities and thus added to the new socially responsible portfolio.

Highlights from the March 19, 2024 Vestry Meeting

Vestry met in person and by telephone on Tuesday, March 19, 2023 at 7:00 PM.

This was the first meeting of the new 2024-25 vestry, including new senior warden Star Blackford and five new vestry members: Carol Newcomb Alutto (appointed to serve out Star's unexpired term), Susan Mancini, Keith Redmill, Laura Wallace, and Dana Whitley. Gia asked everyone to introduce themselves and share what they would be doing were they not attending the vestry meeting. Responses included: just getting home from work, eating dinner, putting children to bed, attending a birthday party, reading, watching Jeopardy, and streaming British mysteries.

Gia offered these updates:

- Much of her time is being spent planning and preparing for Holy Week and its several worship services.
- The Lenten Series is about to conclude; discussions around the provocative book were stirring and enlightening.
- Pastoral Care needs have increased again, a pattern similar to last year.
- Gia's appointment of Mary Bailey as Coordinator of Pastoral Care was confirmed by vestry.

Other discussions and decisions included:

- The annual vestry retreat has been scheduled for Saturday April 27, 2024.
- Delegates and Alternates to the November 2024 Annual Diocesan Convention were appointed during the meeting and shortly
 after. These were delegates Star Blackford, Lisa Graupmann, Rebecca McCauley, and Nancy Elkington plus alternates Laura
 Wallace and Stephen Sollars.
- Visitors included Carrie Troester, director of the Early Education Center (EEC), Bob Hayes, chair of the finance committee, and John Pascoe, parish treasurer.
 - Carrie provided an orientation to the school and spoke to a range of learning opportunities available to the 64 enrolled students by certified and very experienced teachers. She outlined research into replacing the school's playground.
 - Bob and John described two music-related initiatives: (1) replacing 3 wireless microphone packs used by clergy during
 worship services and purchasing 2 new microphones (choir & organ); and (2) hiring a consultant to assist the organ
 committee in evaluating research conducted to date and recommending next steps. Both initiatives were approved by
 vestry and sources of funding were agreed.

EMAIL AND TEXT SPOOFING AND SCAMS

More and more congregations, and ministries are being targeted by scammers and phishing attacks. These emails or text messages often pretend they are a pastor or bishop and ask for private conversation, or the need to for a favor, or to purchase gift cards.

These attacks are a phishing or spoofing scam. This means that the email account or phone number has probably NOT been hacked. Attackers are using an alternate email address or phone number and contacts found using A.I. software.

This kind of attack is often called CEO Phishing or Business Email Compromise. In 2019, the FBI reported that this is a \$26 billion scam.

HOW TO AVOID OR STOP SCAMS

1. Check the email address or phone number that sent the message. Modern email programs often only display the name as a default and not the email address. The attackers use this to their advantage and create addresses with the real name but use a bogus email address.

HOW IT WORKS



The attackers decide on a target (a congregation, ministry or synod) and does a search for names and email addresses of leadership.



The attackers create email addresses with a convincing name or domain to look similar to that of the leadership.



They then use software to find email addresses or phone numbers associated with their target.



They send emails or texts to the found addresses posing as a pastor or bishop to solicit money or information.

Often using gmail or yahoo accounts. Text scammers will use area codes that are in the area you are in, claiming it is a new phone number.

- 2. Look for red flags in the tone and grammar of the email or text. Attackers will want to create a sense of urgency, to prey on your desire to help. They will often claim the bishop or pastor needs something and is in a meeting. Or needs to urgently have a private conversation. These emails will often contain misspellings, strange punctuation, or grammar that is just "off" a bit. Read messages with requests carefully.
- 3. **Ask someone.** Have someone else read the message for you to see if they notice anything weird. Call or email the church or synod office to check what the email address or phone number of person actually is.
- **4. Do not purchase gift cards or give out information.** These scams often ask for the purchase of gift cards or want you to provide further information (for more scams). Never share information or make purchases from a text or email request without verifying information.
- **5. Report it**. Report it to the person or leadership, the chances good that if you received a scam email or text, someone else did too. Also report it to the FCC. If you are the victim of a scam, report it to local law enforcement.
