Upcoming Changes to Crossroads

How do we best share St. John's news with our members? What's the most effective way of keeping our community informed about all that goes on in our parish? How do we reach generations that get their information from social media and also people who don't own computers? These are frequently asked questions around the church office, and not only at St. John's. Every faith community—indeed, every nonprofit, company, and government agency that communicates with people—has to grapple with these challenges.

For many years, the monthly Crossroads newsletter has been St. John's primary means of communicating with members. It was first distributed in print, then as a PDF file via email as electronic media became more common. What staff, lay leaders, and I have noticed in the last couple of years is that fewer and fewer people are actually reading Crossroads. Last summer, I offered a free ice cream cone to anyone who read my column and contacted me about it—and only six of the 400+ people who receive Crossroads, both in print and online, took me up on it. Nearly all of the print copies of Crossroads in the atrium are recycled every month. Low rates of readership mean that people are missing out on important information. The Holy Spirit is up to so much in our parish right now. We want everyone to know about it!

The vestry commissioned a communications audit from a public-relations firm in 2023 to give us professional recommendations for making St. John's communications more effective. This audit urged reformatting Crossroads as an email newsletter, like the Diocese of Southern Ohio's eConnections. This type of newsletter is in broad use these days—I get them from the public library, my alma maters, and my favorite yarn and fabric shops, among many others—and produces a wider readership than a PDF newsletter. With advice from senior warden Star Blackford (whose day job is in marketing and communications), our Parish Engagement Coordinator, Bella Olmstead, has been gradually implementing the communications audit's findings, and now that our new website is fully functional and our social media has been improved, it's time to move on to Crossroads.

Beginning in mid-April, Crossroads will appear as a weekly electronic newsletter that incorporates the weekly announcements. Copies will be printed off and mailed to the 20 or so households that still receive a print Crossroads. Since this will be a significant transition for St. John's, we are going to try this for the next few months and see how it goes. Some of you will welcome this change and ask why we didn't do it sooner. Others will mourn the way Crossroads used to be and want a full print newsletter again. However you feel about the new Crossroads, Bella, Star, and I want to hear from you. Which format gets you to read Crossroads? Are you more aware of formation opportunities, outreach projects, and special events at St. John's? How are St. John's communications helping you to notice the work of the Holy Spirit in our community?

Warden's Corner

Our new Vestry met for the first time on Tuesday, March 18. March vestry meetings often dedicate a significant amount of time to team building; we welcome members just as we've bid former members goodbye, shifting the dynamic of the group each year. Following her monthly Rector's Report, Gia presented an overview of Jack Gibb's Trust Development Theory, a fixture of the College of Congregational Development currently being rolled out in our diocese. Laura Wallace then led the vestry in a team building exercise.

Updates from Gia:

- The Episcopal 101 class, taught by her and David Burman, has 18 participants preparing for confirmation. The class is engaged, insightful, and runs past its allotted time each week.
- Gia continues to serve as chair of our diocese's Mission Share Committee as they work to develop a clear and fair formula for mission share. Their work on proposed formulas is drawing to a close, and they plan to present a recommendation to Diocesan Council in May.

Other March Vestry business:

- Ted Dziemianowicz and John Ross, Property Committee co-chairs, presented a thorough property report to the vestry, calling our attention to the many repairs and updates our various properties need and categorizing them by urgency and importance.
- Following this presentation, the vestry voted to approve the Property Committee's request to submit a grant application to the Episcopal Church Foundation for \$58,000. This grant, if approved, would be used to offset the cost of repairs to Township Hall. These repairs were previously approved by our Finance Committee and vestry and will take place regardless of the outcome of the grant.

At the Lay Weeders' Perennial/Annual Meeting, the theme was responsible care for the environment. Already on St. John's campus, we have a host of native plants, even beyond the Prairie Garden, which is made up of the kinds of plants that were present when Worthington and St. John's were established.

Among other tasks of spring clean-up, lay weeders cut down the long stems of perennials that had been sheltering beneficial insects so they could get through the winter. Pollinator-friendly plants on campus include swamp milkweed, coneflower, chokecherry, little bluestem, showy goldenrod, Ohio spiderwort, Culver's root, and viburnum – among others!

Many of these plants are in the Prairie Garden, to which the Lay Weeders' burn team was able to set fire in late March. Watch for the grasses and flowering plants to emerge and flourish in the coming months. Join us in caring for the earth on Saturday afternoons: April 12, April 26, and May 10. We meet at the sheds at 1:00 and work until 3:00.

Food Pantry

Food pantries across Central Ohio, including the two food pantries that St. John's supports, the Worthington Resource Pantry and the Gladden Food Pantry, have seen a steady growth in the need for their services over the past several years. All of them are committed to serving our neighbors even as possible changes in funding loom on the horizon. Here is how the March Newsletter of the Worthington Resource Pantry expressed their concern and commitment:

Over the past 15 years, Worthington Resource Pantry has witnessed significant shifts at every level of government. Leadership has changed, economic conditions have fluctuated, and a global pandemic reshaped daily life. Through it all, our mission has remained the same ensuring that no neighbor goes hungry. As we look ahead, we remain committed to serving and speaking up for those who rely on food assistance and working to protect vital programs that help families make ends meet.

At the state level, we partner with the Human Service Chamber, Mid-Ohio Food Collective, and the Ohio Association of Food Banks in budget advocacy to ensure that funding for food assistance remains a priority. Cuts to key programs like SNAP and Medicaid would only increase the strain on hunger relief networks across the state, including the Worthington Resource Pantry forcing neighbors to make **impossible choices between food, medicine, and other basic needs**.

Nationally, Congress is debating a budget that could lead to significant cuts to essential programs, including \$2 trillion in spending reductions that would directly impact food security and healthcare access for low-income families. Reducing these programs would not only harm individuals but also weaken our local economy. The Senate will soon decide on potential changes to the budget, making this a critical time for advocacy. We will continue to amplify the voices of our neighbors, urging lawmakers to protect programs that keep food on the table. Now more than ever, we must work together to ensure that no one goes hungry.

Our food baskets in the atrium have been filling nicely in recent weeks. Now more than ever, our support of the food pantries with our food donations and/or financial donations will play a critical role in ensuring that food is available for our hungry neighbors. Although I offer weekly suggestions of items to donate, please know that all kinds of non-perishable food items and toiletries are welcome. Take advantage of specials when you see them! St. John's Launches New Listening Ministry

Our Vestry has approved and funded a new ministry to support our congregations as a subgroup of our Pastoral Care Committee, which Mary Bailey chairs. An Episcopal Priest, Helen Appelberg, started the "Community of Hope International" (COHI) in 1994 to train lay ministers to listen without judgment and with discernment to build relationships with parishioners in person and by phone. The Vestry's approval enabled St. John's to register as a COHI Center.

Training started on March 12 with Beth Hall, Mary Bailey and Cynthia Woodbeck leading ten empathetic volunteers. We meet every Wednesday at 6:30 pm to worship and learn. There are 14 online modules with facilitated discussions (and homework!) which will finish in early June, with an Easter week break. After the training, monthly Circle of Care meetings will commence to ensure that we meet the varied needs of our congregation. Each of us will be paired with another to develop compassionate friendships. Volunteers in our first class are Beth Hall, Mary Bailey, Melissa Christophersen Redmill, Helen Macdonald, Nancy Elkington, Ted Dziemianowicz, Scarlett Winters, Diana Shirley, Wendy Ciriegio, and Cynthia Woodbeck. Some of us are also trained as Eucharistic Visitors, to bring communion to those who cannot come to church.

Gia and David endorse this Benedictine-based ministry, which uses the discipline of morning and evening prayer and follows the annotated writings of Sister Joan Chittister in the book, "The Rule of Benedict: A Spirituality for the 21st Century." 

Financial Summary:

At the end of February, our pledge contributions were under budget by \$29,600; our other plate contributions (which consist primarily of contributions from non-pledging members and plate cash) were over budget by \$6,400; and in total, our revenues were under budget by \$24,900. In total, our operating expenses were over budget by \$13,200, which, in combination with our revenues, left us with a positive cash flow of \$8,900.
