Healing Prayers

St. John's has a longstanding tradition of offering private prayers for healing in the chapel during communion. Many of you have shared how meaningful it is to step into the chapel, speak the fears and joys that weigh on your heart, and lift them up to God who is with us in all the challenges of human life. This summer, we're going to build on that tradition and offer public prayers for healing during both services on Sunday, July 21, between the Confession and the Peace.

David and I were inspired to do this after experiencing public healing prayers ourselves, at the renewal of ordination vows on Tuesday of Holy Week this year. Bishop White led the service, and she observed that the last few years have been terribly difficult on clergy, and, really, all of us. In addition to the losses, illness, and struggles we've faced as individuals, the entire world lived through the trauma of the pandemic. We may seem to be okay on the surface, but many of us are not okay, not really. And the Church knows what to do when people are not okay: we pray for them, lay hands on them, and anoint them with oil, asking God to heal them in body, mind, and spirit. Then Bishop White invited those who wished to come forward for healing prayers. Nearly three-quarters of the congregation did. I knew the pain some of them were facing—loneliness, grief, exhaustion, anxiety, poor health—and others I could only imagine. As we sang hymns, I joined the line, and David did too. One by one, our bishop gently and firmly laid her hands on our heads, prayed for us, and smeared oil on our foreheads in the sign of the cross. Bishop Price was anointed, then he motioned to Bishop White, and he anointed her. Two priests who had been estranged after an interpersonal conflict came forward, clasping each other's hand, to receive prayer and anointing together. I remember gasping as they stepped up to the bishop and murmuring, "That is the work of God right there."

After the liturgy, we were all saying how much we needed healing and how grateful we were that Bishop White had done this for us. It did not fix everything that was broken in our lives. The situations in my life that prompted me to ask for anointing are still present, all these weeks later, but I notice anger turning to sorrow, greater compassion for myself and others. I'm not cured, but God has been at work to heal me. And I trust that others who were there that day have felt that healing too. That service was the holiest moment I had experienced in months, and it was a profound blessing to take part in it.

David and I now want to share God's healing presence and power with all of you. So we invite you to come for prayer and anointing on the 21st. Whatever is going on for you, however you need healing in your life, God wants to heal your hurting body, mind, heart, and spirit. We'll sing hymns together, and pray, and God's creative, loving presence will be in our midst to bring us all to greater wholeness. I hope you will be there to witness it.

Lisa Graupmann made a report concerning the deterioration of the windows in the south stairwell. The Vestry approved a motion to authorize the expenditure of up to \$3,500 for window purchase/repair.

- A Counseling Center, with a team of therapists who specialize in working with teens, young adults, and families to help solve even the most challenging problems.

• The Youth Outreach Program, a team of trained, professional staff that engage with youth to prevent homelessness and provide support and resources to increase stability.

We heard some personal stories from renters which really helped us to see how seriously this issue is affecting ordinary people who just need an affordable, stable, and safe place to live.

Garden Glories!

"Every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit." Matthew 7:17

Trees come down. Have you noticed? All around the campus, trees have been taken down. Some were good trees but deemed to be too close to the buildings. Some were causing problems for us and our neighbors. Some were just bad trees.

Bradford pear trees bear bad fruit – sticky substances that can ruin the finish on a car – and the trees themselves are so invasive that they are now illegal in the state of Ohio. Over the last few years, all four of them have been cut down. One magical yew grew to be taller than the Parish House and was causing moisture problems on the roof and the side of the building. It had to go, as did others that hugged the church too closely. The two taxus on either side of the Chapel door were overgrown with root systems that can affect the church itself. One of the two dying maples in front of the church that was dropping



large branches is gone, and the other one will follow it.

The Property Committee has overseen this project in consultation with the Lay Weeders, who are researching landscape changes with native plants that will fill the spaces responsibly. While a tree may be causing problems, it is an enormous asset to the environment as it captures carbon. We hope to remedy this loss. Happily, St. John's fig tree continues to be a good tree that bears good fruit!



Organ Committee Update

Greetings from the Organ Committee. After a hiatus over the winter, the committee resumed its work in early spring on the project to restore or replace our Schantz organ in the nave. Working with our consultant, David Kazimir, who is the curator of organs at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, we reviewed the five proposals that we received last year. We eliminated three of those proposals for reasons of cost or other concerns. The two remaining are from The Schantz Organ Company (Orrville, OH) and Muller Pipe Organ Company (Croton, OH). While the proposals for these companies were both considered worthy of further consideration, we did have some questions and comments on which we are following up with them.

In addition, our consultant brought to our attention another company that he thought could be a good match for us and our project, Parsons Pipe Organ Builders of Canandaigua, NY, a company that David knows well. We invited one of their representatives to visit St. John's in early June to see and listen to our organ and discuss the project with David. According to David, the representative from Parsons expressed excitement at the opportunity to work with us and our space. As David said of the meeting, he came away from it feeling confident that Parsons is "a builder whose core sense of the art was based around how an instrument can effectively serve a space and provide lasting musical support for music and liturgy." We expect to have a proposal from Parsons within the next several weeks.

Our next meeting is scheduled for July 15, at which time we hope to be able to review the updated proposals from Schantz and Muller and the new proposal from Parsons. The next step after that will likely be to schedule meetings with each of the builders to discuss their proposals so that we can then begin the process of comparing the proposals against our criteria and against each other so that we can develop a recommendation for vestry as to which proposal the committee believes would be the best balanced choice for St. John's. We will, of course, provide further updates as we move along in the process.
