After two academic years at St. John's, seminarian Catherine Duffy is moving on to the next chapter of her ministry. Catherine's last day with us will be Sunday, May 5. God willing, she will graduate from Bexley-Seabury Seminary on May 10. The next ordination of priests is scheduled for Saturday, June 15, at 11:00 a.m. at Christ Church Cathedral in Cincinnati, and I have every reason to believe that Catherine will be ordained priest then. She will begin her new post as associate rector at St. Patrick's in Dublin in July.

Catherine has learned the life and ministry of a priest during her time with us even as she has made substantial contributions to our community. Her sermons at Sunday and Wednesday services and her pastoral care have brought us wisdom, consolation, and guidance as we walk the path of Jesus. She has led two adult-formation opportunities—an Advent series and a Lenten day of preparation—whose engaging topics and thoughtful presentation invited us to enter into these two holy seasons more fully. She has participated fully in staff and vestry meetings, collaborating with lay and clergy colleagues in ministry with skill, generosity of spirit, and creativity. (Most memorably, when a squirrel got into Kilbourne Hall and we were all at our wit's end trying to remove it, Catherine volunteered her dogs to come in and take care of it. The squirrel must have overheard. It was quickly motivated to find its own way out.) This Easter season, I've especially appreciated the way Catherine has pushed beyond her comfort zone to chant parts of our liturgy. Singing in public doesn't come easily to her, and with some help from Nick Taylor's voice lessons, she has improved her vocal ability and learned to overcome her anxiety. This is one example of the many ways she has been growing into leadership over the last two years.

We'll bless Catherine and hold a festive coffee hour—y'all know those three words mean cake—in her honor on Sunday, May 5. Cards for her can be brought to church then, or mailed to the parish office.

Although Catherine's ministry at St. John's is coming to an end, we will continue to see her around the Columbus deanery and the Diocese of Southern Ohio. The Episcopal Church is pretty much a small town: there aren't that many of us, and our paths cross frequently once we step outside our own congregations. So this is less a farewell and more of a "see you later." I hope you'll be here on the 5th to wish Catherine Godspeed!

The Presence of the Divine in Interfaith Gatherings

In the few short weeks since Easter Sunday, we at St. John's have had the blessing to take part in two interfaith events - one each with our Muslim and Jewish neighbors.

On the evening of Wednesday, April 3rd, we hosted friends from the Turkish American Society of Ohio for an Iftar Dinner, where we learned about the Muslim season of Ramadan, had DEEE-licious food, and made new friends!

Then on the evening of Thursday, April 18th, members of St. John's - as well as Worthington Presbyterian Church and Worthington United Methodist Church - went to Congregation Beth Tikvah for a more somber yet hopeful event. Rabbi Rick Kellner spoke to us about the origins of antisemitism and about the ways in which Jews in Worthington (including kids) encounter antisemitism today. We also learned about ways we can counter this antisemitism (like the church that invited a synagogue to complete a Bar Mitzvah ceremony inside their sanctuary after a bomb threat was made against the synagogue).

What I love about events like these is how each of our communities can retain our own religious identities while honoring the divine presence in each other!

Nehemiah Action Sponsored by B.R.E.A.D.

On Tuesday, May 21st, at 7:00 pm, the B.R.E.A.D. organization (Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity) will hold its annual event, the Nehemiah Action, at the Celeste Center on the Ohio State Fairgrounds. The goal is to invite as many as possible to demonstrate to public officials the power of people who support and are committed to addressing key social justice issues. Encouraging officials to use unspent American Rescue Plan dollars on more affordable housing, continuing to reduce gang violence in Columbus neighborhoods, and promoting environmental justice by developing public policies, are just a few of the issues.

Most recently, B.R.E.A.D. has gotten the Department of Public Safety to create the Columbus Violence Reduction initiative, which is reducing gang violence. The organization has worked with the Chief of the Columbus Police Department to apply to the Georgetown University School of Law to conduct Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement Training (A.B.L.E.). The goal of this training is to prepare officers to successfully intervene to prevent harm and to create a culture that supports peer intervention. B.R.E.A.D. worked with Judge Elizabeth Gill to implement and establish "Restorative Justice Circles" in nine neighborhoods throughout the county to divert non-violent, youth offenders from the court system.

Episcopal Night at the Symphony

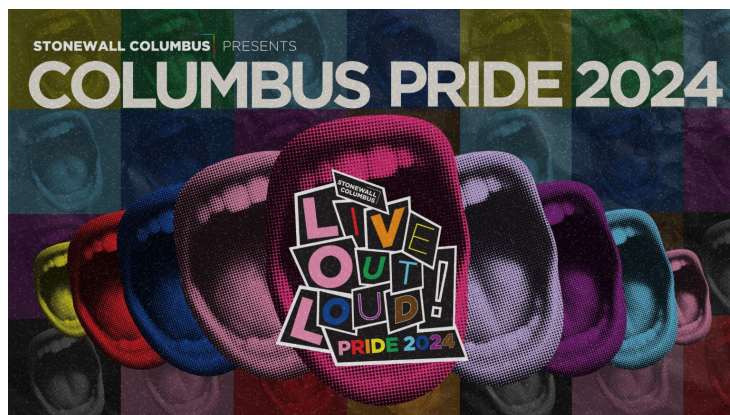
The 7th Episcopal Night at the Symphony will be held on Friday evening, May 24, at the Ohio Theatre. The evening begins with a reception, bar, and 'heavy' hors d'oeuvres at 5:30 pm on the 4th floor of the Ohio Theatre, followed by Mozart's Mass in C minor, featuring The Columbus Symphony Orchestra & Chorus at 7:30 pm with prime orchestra seats. Mozart's sublime Mass in C minor was, like his Requiem, left unfinished at the time of his death. Numerous scholars have published reconstructions of the work. The edition used for this concert is a new completion by German musicologist Ulrich Leisinger, premiered in Germany in 2019. Reservations are now open through May 10th, \$60 per person for the whole event or \$35 per person for the reception only (if you already have symphony tickets). Last month, the Worthington Resource Pantry celebrated Volunteer Appreciation Month by honoring their incredible team of volunteers for all the ways they serve at the pantry. In the calendar year 2023, WRP volunteers donated 19,649 hours of service and sorted 1,698,489 pounds of food, which provided 1,291,669 meals to 111,918 neighbors from 28,470 families, including 4,113 deliveries. Garden Glories

St. John's arboretum! As Lay Weeders go about the task of caring for St. John's garden beds, we are surrounded by a glorious variety of trees. At the end of April, the white redbud and the dogwoods are blooming, the “lace tree” in the churchyard is getting ready to feather, and the ginkgo tree is holding its own against the deer. Thankfully, the grand copper beech outside the offices' windows is leafing out as if it had never had a health crisis last year. The Bible Garden's fig tree is sprouting leaves – with hopes for figs in the fall! Our paper bark maple is just beginning to leaf out, while the walnuts in the churchyard are taking their time.

Shading the front of the church is a line of maples, two of which are nearing the end of their days. Because they are dangerous, they will soon be taken down. Several other trees and overgrown shrubs – among them a hemlock, a yew (yes, it grew up to become a tree) and two overgrown taxus – are encroaching on the buildings and need to be trimmed or removed to prevent damage.

Bradford pear trees are illegal in Ohio. Though they make a spectacular display in spring, they are so invasive that they are considered a threat to the environment. They are also punishing to cars and any other equipment left under them as they drop their sticky resin. The Bradford pear in the staff parking lot and one in the Bible garden were removed two years ago. This year, we'll be taking out the other one in the playground.

Saddened as we are to lose trees, sometimes they need to go. A huge walnut tree in the parking lot, two trees that were dropping leaves and needles into the air conditioning unit, and a small Bradford pear have left the campus already this spring. Lay Weeders are grateful to the Property Committee for overseeing this project. In some cases, they are doing the work themselves, while in other instances, a contractor will do the work. The city will take care of the maple trees.

Trees are friends to our planet, absorbing carbon and helping purify the air we breathe. We are beginning to plan for their replacements.

Meanwhile, May is full of promise in the gardens. Iris, forget-me-nots, lilies, lily-of-the-valley, pulmonaria, Solomon's seal, vinca, violets, and Jack-in-the-pulpits will be greeting us this month.

The next working afternoons are **May 25th and June 8th. Come join us!** 1:00 pm at the sheds. We will **NOT** be in the gardens on May 11th because of an event on the Green.

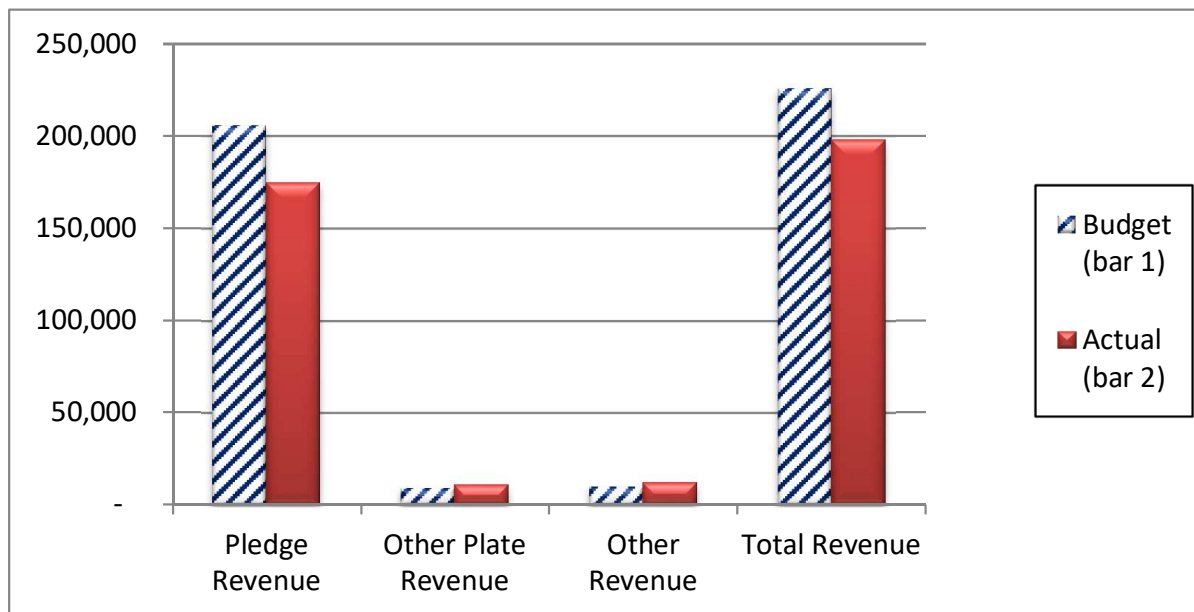

Financial Summary:

At the end of March, our pledge contributions were under budget by \$30,900; our other plate contributions (which consist primarily of contributions from non-pledging members and plate cash) were over budget by \$1,400; and in total, our revenues were under budget by \$27,600. In total, our operating expenses were over budget by \$11,400, which, in combination with our revenues, left us with a negative cash flow of \$22,200. Our operating deficit was supplemented with planned withdrawals from our Property and Staff investment accounts.



Highlights from the April 16, 2024 Vestry Meeting

Vestry met in person and on Zoom on Tuesday, April 16, 2023 at 7:00 PM.

Lisa Graupmann opened the meeting by reading an excerpt from the book [The Little Flowers of St. Francis](#) (including two stories about Friar Juniper).

Gia offered these updates on how she is spending her time:

- Recovering from Holy Week. Gia offered thanks to all who made the liturgies possible: musicians, the choir, Altar Guild, ushers, greeters, acolytes, lectors, chalice ministers, and the staff of St. John's. This was our first Good Friday service since before the pandemic and it went well. The Easter Sunday service attendance was up by 40 over 2023.
- Supporting a high level of pastoral care needs in the parish.
- Concluding Catherine's time at St. John's – her last Sunday with us is May 5. We confidently expect her [anticipated ordination](#) (not yet confirmed as of April 16) will happen on June 15 from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm at Christ Church Cathedral in Cincinnati.
- Preparing for the [Deanery Vestry Day](#) and our own Vestry Retreat.
- Gia took bereavement leave (travelled to Scotland) when her mother-in-law passed away after Easter.

Vestry discussed a number of issues tied to the central focus of the annual Vestry Retreat on April 27:

- Committee structure: history and review
- [Diocesan Discernment Gatherings](#) running now through May 1
- St. John's Vestry Retreat on April 27 to be facilitated by Rev. Vicki Zust, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church
- Develop a new form of welcoming after each service; vestry members actively seek out and welcome new faces
- Continue to expand content in the new website (<https://www.stjohnsworthington.org/>) including clergy and staff bios, ministries, and more. Read Gia's [article](#) about the new website in the April issue of Crossroads.

Decisions that were reached unanimously:

- Authorized a budget of up to \$3,600 to remove several at-risk trees and shrubs
- Authorized a small campaign to raise \$30,000 toward the complete replacement of the EEC's playground (the EEC will cover the other 2/3 of estimated costs)
- Approved the acceptance of an anonymous donation of \$70,000 to the Staff and Clergy Fund
