
Changes in the Sanctuary

It was at the forefront of Troy Justesen's mind over the last few years of how we could improve the worship experience for our congregation, celebrating with us each weekend in-person and online. He worked extensively with Arizona Pro Sound, Inc, to figure out the cost and timeline for installing new equipment that would last DHLC for some years to come. The lighting that was replaced, as an example, was difficult to find bulbs for. Now, the sanctuary is brightly lit, the sound is clear, and the viewing experience is better.

We hope Troy would be pleased with these updates, as we honored him throughout the recent renovations. The goal is to complete updates to the Overson Chapel and the Lokken Fellowship Hall in the months ahead.

"Suzanne and I stay in our Christmas pajamas, made by my mom, all day long on Christmas Day. Even when we used to pick up Suzanne's mom in her pajamas, we wore ours out and about." - Pastor Craig

"Growing up, my siblings and I were allowed to check our Christmas stockings when we woke up, but we were not allowed to open gifts from family or Santa until after Christmas worship services. This is a tradition my husband and I continued with our children." - Mary McNichols

"Growing up in Queens, New York, I was lucky because our house had a chimney with a fireplace, so Santa had a way in. One mid-December, I was in my basement, saw a little window in the middle of the house and decided to open it as I was curious. To my surprise, there were all the wrapped Christmas gifts lying on the sand foundation! I used to say when we opened the gifts,

how strange it was that Santa's handwriting was the same as my mom's. I kept that observation to myself as my brother was six years younger and I didn't want to ruin it for him." - Christine Kelly-Smimmo

"As far back as I can remember, my family would gather to make Tamales for Christmas dinner. On Christmas Eve. we would prepare all the ingredients and make the tamales that day. Everyone would then go to the Christmas tree, pick one gift to open, and watch "A Christmas Story" on TV. On Christmas morning, we would steam or cook the tamales and enjoy them for Christmas dinner." - Mark Soto

"When our four sons were little, I would make a huge batch of sugar cookies the week before Christmas. Among the delicious cookie scents and in the cozy warmth of the kitchen, I would set the entire kitchen table up as a cookie decorating workshop. It was a meaningful, fun mess. The boys loved it! Now that they are becoming adults themselves, we still do this, but on a smaller scale with much less mess." - Annie Vrooman

"Growing up in a large family—11 children—celebrating Christmas on Christmas Day was challenging. We would celebrate on Christmas Eve with a family dinner, open presents, and enjoy family time together. 

We Continue to Give

Scholarships and Legacy Giving

Our DHLC Foundation Board recently made a big decision to increase the number of scholarships for ELCA seminary students from three to four! "We were able to do this because of the generosity of church members and the amazing returns on our investments," said Board Chairman Jon Fogg.

Three of the four scholarships will be awarded to Luther Seminary students, while the fourth will go to Wartburg Seminary students. The Board also decided to honor our current and past pastors by naming the awards after them. Two of the three scholarships for Luther will be awarded in the names of Martin Overson and Craig Larson, both of whom are graduates of Luther. The new Wartburg scholarship will be named in honor of Michael Sager, a Wartburg alumnus.

In addition to scholarships, the Board has been focusing on legacy gifting, which involves remembering the Foundation in our estate planning. Once we're gone, we want to ensure that our last check goes to Desert Hills Lutheran Church. By including the Foundation in our end-of-life planning, we can make a lasting impact on our church.

Even small contributions can accumulate to significant amounts. For instance, in each of the last three years, approximately 50 church members have passed away. If most of them had left \$1,000 to the Foundation, in ten years, that \$150,000 could grow to \$332,000! That's enough to create at least one more scholarship and provide funds for local Christian education and capital improvements at the church.

Bring donations of unopened rice, beans, and canned goods from October 11-19.

During the first weekend of each month, a food drive is held at DHLC to support our community food banks. Unopened, non-perishable food is collected to help residents in need.

The annual offering of ELCA Good Gifts will be on the weekends of December 6-7 and December 13-14. You make a difference when you select a good gift or two that help people in need around the world.
