# **PREPARING FOR EASTER**

The most significant event in the Christian calendar is Easter, the celebration of Christ's resurrection. Christians can benefit greatly from this observance by preparing their hearts and minds through devotions which lead to personal repentance, prayer and commitment.

The preparation period, called "Lent", begins on Ash Wednesday, forty-six days before Easter Sunday. This period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where He fasted and where Satan tempted Him. Although many Christians do not fast during this period, we are all encouraged to make this an intentional season to focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice and resurrection.

This booklet is designed to be a reference and inspiration to Christians as they prepare (individually or collectively) during the Lenten period. This resource contains eleven devotionals, prepared by TWP members. Each devotion references a scripture and a sacred hymn. The first one begins on Ash Wednesday. It is followed by six devotions, one for each of the next six weeks leading up to the Holy Days before Easter. The remaining four devotions are to be used on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil (Saturday), and Easter Sunday.


As Christians you are encouraged to use these devotions, the biblical scriptures they represent and the recording of a sacred hymn, to meditate, pray and focus on ways to improve your spiritual life and relationship with God. Hopefully, this preparation will result in your celebration of Easter with a renewed understanding of the observance, and a rededication of your life with the risen Christ.

# **PENITENCE AND RIGHTEOUSNESS**

Be careful not to do your 'acts of righteousness' before men, to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in Heaven. (Matthew 6:1)

Ash Wednesday starts the season of Lent; a period when we are encouraged to engage in self-reflection and introspection.

It is a time for penitence (remorse) for our shortcomings, and a time for commitment (rededication) to grow in righteousness. It is a time to focus on becoming more like Christ in our character (nature), conscience (attitude) and conduct (faithfulness).

In the passage we read today, Jesus teaches that we are to live for the glory of God. We are to have the right motives for all that we do—which is to glorify the Father, and not ourselves. In Matthew 6:1-6 Jesus provides two examples of actions that can be used for self-serving motives and vain glory: giving publicly to the needy and offering public prayers. And in verses 16-18 He offers similar comments about seeking attention during fasting.

Each of the three examples Jesus points out may be undertaken for the wrong reasons: to seek attention, to receive honor, and to be praised by others. Jesus says that those who engage in such self-promotion do not receive a reward from God. Their "reward" (vainglory) is here on earth, not in Heaven.

In verses 19-21 Jesus turns to the things we value in life. He calls these our "treasures" (our priorities in life). Our treasures can be either material (fancy home, financial savings, collections) or non-material (status, position, activities, passions). There are many things in our lives that are important to us and that we value. Lent is a time for us to consider which of these "treasures" (priorities) might be getting in the way of our relationship with God and our growth to become more like Jesus.

In the hymn "Higher Ground", the author states in verse 3 that he wants to live above the ways of the world, and in verse 4 says "Lord, lead me on to Higher Ground." His point is that as children of God, we are to live differently. We have different standards. We seek to serve God and receive His approval...not the approval of others.

God calls those who believe in Him to follow Him - to become the children of God (I John 3:2). As God's children we are called to become more like His son Jesus Christ in the way we live our lives (1 John 2:6). During this season of Lent may we all reflect upon our shortcomings, and then rededicate ourselves to live our lives as unto the Lord in all that we do (Colossian 3:23-24).

# **PROMISE AND FULFILLMENT: JESUS, THE SUFFERING SERVANT**

The early Christians believed that Jesus was the anointed Messiah, sent by God as Redeemer of His wayward people. Isaiah included four sections now called *Servant Songs*: Isaiah 42: 1-4, 49: 1-6, 52: 4-5; 52:13 - 53: 12. For early Christians there was promise in Hebrew scriptures and fulfillment in Jesus Christ.

Isaiah described the condition of the people: *We all, like sheep have gone astray... and the Lord has laid on Him the inequity of us all.* (53:6)

He emphasized the suffering servant: *He was despised and rejected by mankind; a man of suffering and familiar with pain.* (53:3)

He endured suffering to save His people: *He was pierced for our transgressions, bruised for our inequities; the punishment that brought us peace was on Him, and by his wounds we are healed.* 53:5

Isaiah linked redemption to suffering. Christians see parallels between Jesus and the suffering servant; both were despised, wounded, bruised, whipped and silent; akin to a lamb brought to the slaughter.

(53:3, 5,7) The Servant is the Redeemer.
The Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all. (53:6)
He poured out His life unto death; He bore the sin of many and made intercession for the transgressors. (53:12)
Despite suffering, this servant shall be raised and lifted up and highly exalted. (52:13)
He will bring justice. (42:1)
My righteous servant will justify many. (42:1)

<u>The triumph of Christ over death is the meaning of Easter.</u> <u>The crucified one becomes the exalted one.</u> Lent ends not in death, but in death overcome by resurrection!

# **BLOOD OF THE NEW COVENANT**

And He said to them, "This is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly, I say to you, I shall not drink again of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God." (Mark 14:24-26)

This statement from Jesus occurred in the Upper Room near the end of the Passover meal. Jesus was instituting what is called "communion" or the Lord's Supper. Today, it is one of two sacraments practiced in many Christian churches. The second common sacrament is baptism.

Jesus broke off a portion of the loaf of bread and passed it to one of His disciples who did the same. After Jesus had encouraged them to eat the bread, He then said, "... this is My body."

Then Jesus lifted up a cup, encouraged them to drink from their cups, and said, "Drink from it, all of you; for this is My blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for forgiveness of sins . . ." In the very next verse, Jesus says that He would not drink again from the "fruit of the vine" until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God. Jesus was using imagery or symbolism to communicate an idea. The bread and wine were symbols of His death on the cross.

Under the new blood covenant, Jesus could remove man's sins when he or she believed in Him. That is, their sins were remitted, or canceled, when he or she believed and trusted in God. The New Covenant replaced the Old Covenant – Mosaic Covenant or The Law. The old covenant could never remove sins since the blood of sheep and goats could not take away sin. Jesus offered Himself, the spotless lamb of God, as a sacrifice that would forgive sin once and for all. (Mark 14:24 NIV). After Christ's crucifixion, this Old Covenant was obsolete. The New Covenant gave life – spiritual life—a new and better way.

The death of Jesus' physical body made it possible for us to have our sins forgiven. This new covenant was and is the extension of God's love for us so we could live in relationship with him.

During this Lenten season, let us thank Him for the blood of the new covenant.

Alas! And did my Savior bleed And did my Sovereign die? Would He devote that sacred head For such a worm as I?


Was it for crimes that I had done He groaned upon the tree? Amazing pity! Grace unknown! And love beyond degree!

#### THE SOURCE OF OUR STRENGTH

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples, "Sit here, while I go over there and pray." And taking with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and watch with me." And going a little farther he fell on his face and prayed, saying, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will." And he came to the disciples and found them sleeping. And he said to Peter, "So, could you not watch with me one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." (Matt. 26:36-41)

Falling on His face in prayer, in a dark olive grove, Jesus is in literal agony, full of sorrow and sweating profusely. He has prayed to His Father that, if possible, the cup of God's judgment could pass from Him; though He has made it clear that He will submit to the Father's will. He returned to find His three most trusted disciples sleeping instead of "watching" with Him.

Now Jesus urges them to watch and pray. He wants them to ask that they not fall prey to temptation. Jesus may be talking about the temptation to sleep, or He might mean the temptation that will soon arrive to abandon Jesus because of danger. Jesus acknowledges that their spirit is willing to do what is right and honorable, but their flesh—their desires, appetites, urges—is weak. To *be tempted* is no sin, but when we fall to temptation, it is our fault alone.

Jesus' words provide a clear instruction for one way to battle temptation to do wrong. **Prayer**. Prayer is a God-given weapon against our own sinful desires. God provides for believers to overcome temptation, in part, through urgent and faithful prayer.

We need to submit to whatever God's will is for our lives. Jesus recognized this; He asked God to take away the suffering, recognizing that nothing is impossible for God; but He knew that God knows best. Sometimes we need God to say "No" to our prayers.

Some things are outside of the control of human beings. Sometimes our body has a mind of its own, and it is debilitating. Jesus showed all of this to His disciples, for to know that He was human, and He had struggles that are beyond Him.

So today, accept with faith that God is the ultimate Source of Our Strength in everything. Take everything to the Lord in prayer. AMEN!

#### BETRAYAL

Reflecting on the events in the Garden of Gethsemane: Jesus entered the Garden with Peter, James, and John. Jesus prayed long and hard for God to release Him from the upcoming tragedy, but followed His plea with, "...not my will but thine be done."

Now Judas, <u>who betrayed him</u>, knew the place, because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. John 18:2 Going at once to Jesus, Judas said, "Greeting, Rabbi." and kissed him. Matthew 26:49

We learn from the Old Testament the teaching of Soloman: *Do not betray another man's confidence* (Proverbs 25:9). Judas violated the confidence of Jesus, causing Him suffer "draconian consequences".

What is BETRAYAL? Betrayal is the breaking or violation of a presumptive contract, trust or confidence that produces moral or psychological conflict within a relationship amongst individuals.

Because our Lord and Savior had established a strong, trusting relationship with Judas, the pain and agony of Judas' betrayal couldn't have been greater; but our Lord exhibited the ultimate sacrifice by saying: *Friend, do what you came for*? Matt: 26:50.

After Judas kissed Him, Jesus was immediately "seized and arrested." The Lord's Son was then crucified due to the betrayal of Judas. We must know and realize that there are negative consequences from betrayal.

During this season of Lent, we should prayerfully dedicate our lives to true **honesty and integrity with all relationships**. We should reflect on Christ's sacrifice on the cross and give prayerful thought to the true meaning of His sacrifice.

Christ, came to serve, live, and die for our sins. Lent ends on the glorious day of Easter when we celebrate Jesus' resurrection. We are no longer cursed to the grave, but when we confess our sins, we are forgiven!

# SUBMITTING TO GOD'S PROMISES

# *Those who had arrested Jesus took him to Caiaphas the high priest, where the teachers of the law and the elders had assembled.* Matthew 26:57

As we live out our life, submission to God's will, in place of our personal desire, clearly demonstrates our love for Christ and for God the Father.

In Matthew's account of Jesus's trial before Caiphas and the elders, Jesus demonstrates for all humankind how He surrendered His self-will. Indeed, Jesus knowingly submits to the will of His Father, to the point of death, in this greatest example of faithfulness and obedience imaginable.

Initially, the trial was a sham with witnesses giving false testimony by distorting Jesus's words. Witnesses claimed that Jesus said He was able to destroy and rebuild the temple in three days; and was therefore a threat to Roman authority. Their attempts were so transparently false that their eyewitness testimony failed. The high priest then realized that without Jesus's own testimony, His conviction was in doubt and Jesus would be released.


Jesus had not spoken in His defense; thus fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah 53:7. *He was oppressed and He was afflicted, yet He did not open His mouth; like a lamb that is led to slaughter, and like a sheep that is silent before its shearers.* 

In exasperation, Caiaphas stood up and pleads with Jesus, "Do you make no answer? What is it that these men are testifying against you?"

In this pivotal moment Jesus faced a decision, "to live or to die". Not speaking would justifiably demonstrate His faithfulness to prophecy and spare His life. Declaring His identity as the Son of God would demonstrate His faithfulness to the Father and result in death. His choice paid the price for our sins and gave eternal life to those who believe in Him.

Our choice is to believe that His sacrifice reconciled our sinful life with God the Father. As the sacred hymn says, "Jesus paid it all. All to Him I owe. Sin had left a crimson stain, He washed it white as snow." **Praise God!**

# Forgiveness

The Lord turned and looked straight at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him: "Before the rooster crows today, you will disown me three times." (Luke 22:61)

Jesus knew Peter's heart. Peter was a "go getter"; impulsive, eager, and overly emotional at times. We know Peter was restored, but the hurt in Peter's heart lingered. In John 21:15-19, Jesus asked Peter three times *Do you love me*? John tells us that Peter was grieved over this.

Sin does that. Forgiveness from our Lord is not earned, it is given by His grace. Peter would be used mightily by the Lord on Pentecost and to establish the Lord's church in Jerusalem and beyond. God would fulfill His promise to Peter to build His name upon Peter's life, just as He had said that *Upon this rock, I will build my church*. Matthew 16:18. Jesus knew Peter's heart, and He knew Peter would return with enthusiasm and devotion.

Failure is not final. We all fail, and we all blow it. The Hymn writer of *Amazing Grace* would become a pastor despite having been a slave trader. On two occasions, John Newton would realize forgiveness for his sins. First, he was saved during a horrible storm where he could have lost his life. God would preserve John a second time after he became sick on another voyage. John recognized God's grace and sought His forgiveness. Regretfully, he did not leave the slave trade immediately. At the age of 39, he left the slave trade. With the encouragement of others, John would not only serve as a pastor, but he would become a mighty voice to end slavery in England.

John Newton is remembered for these great words: *Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now I'm found, was blind but now I see.* He truly understood the grace of God in this hymn which has been sung my thousands.

#### Failure is not final. God's grace is more powerful than our sin.

For it is by grace you have been saved through faith..., Ephesians 2:8.

#### **CHRIST THE KING**

"You are the king, then!" said Pilate. Jesus answered, "you are right in saying I am a king, in fact for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone on this side of truth listens to me." (John 18:37)

The scene of the interrogation of Jesus by Pilate the Roman Governor took place in the **Judgment Hall** of the former palace of King Herod. The Roman citizens could not enter, nor could they pass judgment on a convicted criminal so they handed Jesus over to Pilate to pass judgment. Pilate had heard of Jesus but never had he seen Him face to face. The interrogation went like this:

Are you the King of the Jews? he asked. Is that what you say or has someone told this to you? Jesus answered. What is it that you have done? he asked. My kingdom is not of this world but now is of another place. Jesus answered. So, you are a King then? he asked.

# Jesus replied, *The reason I came into this world is to testify to the truth; everyone who knows the truth listens to me.*


Then Pilate presented Jesus again to the people, washed his hands, and said:

You can take him and crucify him for I find no fault in him.

Frustration and anger often come to light when people don't recognize or are not willing to accept the **truth**. # **Behold the Man**

*Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged.* (John 19:1)

The Jewish leaders who felt threatened by Jesus' popularity arrested Him and turned Him over to Pilate to be executed. Pilate examined Jesus but found no reason for His arrest and certainly not for putting Him to death. Pilate tried to free Jesus, but the Jews were determined to have Him crucified. When Pilate felt his position as ruler was in danger he gave in to the Jews and had Jesus crucified.

But all of this was not because the Jews got their way or that Pilate gave in to them or that Satan triumphed over Jesus. This all happened because God had preordained that His Son would be crushed and humiliated and be made to be sin so that the wrath of God could be poured out on Jesus as payment for the forgiveness of the sins of all mankind.

We need to understand that God's timing of these events was perfect. Good Friday occurred the day after Jesus ate the Passover meal with His apostles. Passover was the celebration and remembrance of the Hebrews being set free from slavery in Egypt. The death of Jesus on Good Friday was timed so that mankind could celebrate and remember the setting free of humanity from slavery to sin and Satan and hell. The only thing that humans need to do is to accept Jesus Christ as their Savior and follow Him.

In order for all this to happen the Second Person of the Trinity humbled Himself and became a human being while still being deity. He became the God-Man who walked on earth for 33 years as a normal person, although He was empowered to perform miracles. It was necessary for Him to become a human because, as deity, the Son of God was eternal and could not die or shed blood for the forgiveness of our sins. But unlike all other humans Jesus was totally obedient to the Law of Moses and He obeyed His Father in all respects and at all times being perfectly sinless.

Jesus was tempted by Satan throughout His life, but He never sinned. So, He was the perfect Sacrifice provided by God as the Lamb of God Who takes away the sin of the world. That Sacrifice was offered up to God at the cross on Good Friday.

#### JESUS COMPLETES THE WORK GOD GAVE HIM TO DO

When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished," With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit. (John 19:30).

In the Greek New Testament "It is finished" is only one word: "Tetelestai", which means: "to bring to an end", "to finish", "to complete", "to accomplish", or "to pay what one owes". Indeed, on the cross, Jesus has "finished" in every sense of 'tetelestai'. He accomplishes all that the Father has given him to do (John 17:4). He fulfilled all of the requirements of the law, fulfills all of our obligations, pays all of our debt to sin, and triumphs over all of his enemies (Col. 2:13-15), and sets us free from sin that we my to live His very life and experience His presence.


John tells us that Jesus 'bowed his head and gave up his spirit". Luke 23:46 tells us that Jesus called out in a loud voice, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." So, if there is any sorrow in our hearts at the sight of Jesus on the cross is should be that of a remorse that leads to repentance; for Jesus chose this road to walk; he chose to complete and fulfill his Father's will; and in his last breath — **He gave** his life — it wasn't taken from him (John 10:18).

Jesus could not have truthfully declared "Tetelestai — It Is Finished" if he had not with every step along the way to the cross declared "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." "Commend" in this sense means 'to entrust', or 'to present for acceptance and approval'. This, too, is how we are to live – in every breath, in every step, and in every thought along the way – entrusting all of our ways and all of life to God. When you do you too may be able to say that you have completed the work that God has given you to do.

<u>Prayer</u> "Father, today as I rise from my bed to do all the things that need to be done — into your hands I commend my spirit. Father, as I meet the demands that others may have on my time — into your hands I commend my spirit. Father, for opportunities to tell others of my Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ – into your hands I commend my Spirit. Father, in every hour and in every day, with every thought and every word and every deed — into your hands I commend my spirit."

None of us will ever be given the tasks that Jesus was given, but each of us has been given something to do and by His Spirit each of us has been equipped to do it. Are you doing it? May you continue in that work which our Lord has given you to do; and may you always commend your spirit to our Lord — who is the perfecter, "the great finisher", of our faith (Heb. 12:2).
