Non-Book Resources

- **Lectio 365 App.** This is a prayer/devotional app that is available for your phone or tablet. It includes both a readable devotion everyday for morning and evening and the option to listen to it read audibly.
- **The Bible App.** This app contains more translations of the Bible than you'll ever need as well as thousands of studies and reading plans. It also allows you to become "friends" with people you know and read through plans together and share comments and notes. This can be a great tool for a group to read a plan alongside one another and engage the material together each day.
- Discipleship Bands App. This is an app developed by Seedbed publishing and intended to be used as a platform for facilitating a Wesleyan discipleship band group. There is a guide to banding available to read on the app, a guide to each week's meeting, and the option for groups to participate in studies together and interact with one another. A discipleship band is a same-gender group of 3-5 people who gather weekly to answer a set list of questions which challenge the group members to share intimately, and confidentially, about their personal walk with Christ and confess their sins and shortcomings.
- Brick. This is a new device that allows you to limit your smartphone's capabilities to help combat digital addiction while maintaining some of the useful functions of your phone. In the Brick app you select either what apps you want it to block (or allow) while in the Brick mode. You then touch your phone to the Brick which you leave somewhere such as your fridge and your phone remains "Bricked" until you touch it to the device again. My family has created a "Sabbath" setting which we set our devices to on our Sabbath to allow us to listen to worship music, audiobooks, read ebooks, and receive emergency calls but prevents us from the distraction of email, social media, news alerts, etc. This device could also be used during group meetings to allow group members to still receive emergency calls from family but not be otherwise distracted by their devices. Prayer

- How to Pray: a simple guide for normal people, Pete Greig. Accessibly and engagingly, Pete demystifies prayer, helping you see it as attainable and enjoyable, and ultimately life-giving and life-changing. How to Pray really is a simple guide for normal people; for anyone who wants to learn more about prayer, for those just starting out. This study can be done in 8-12 sessions.
- How to Hear God, Pete Greig. The follow up to Pete Greig's How To Pray is a practical and encouraging guide to the other side of the prayer conversation: how to hear what God might be saying in response to the prayers we pray. Centered on the story of the disciples who encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus, Pete uses his characteristic accessible and practical style to unpack the many ways that God speaks to us today. Spiritual Formation

Practicing the Way, John Mark Comer. We are constantly being formed by the world around us. To be formed by Jesus will require us to become his apprentice. To live by what the first Christian disciples called a Rule of Life—a set of practices and relational rhythms that slow us down and open up space in our daily lives for God to do what only God can do—transforms the deepest parts of us to become like him. This introduction to spiritual formation is full of John Mark Comer's trademark mix of theological substance and cultural insight as well as practical wisdom on developing your own Rule of Life. These ancient practices have much to offer us. By learning

to rearrange our days, we can follow the Way of Jesus. We can be with him. Become like him. And do as he did.

- The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry, John Mark Comer. "Who am I becoming?" That was the question nagging pastor and author John Mark Comer. Outwardly, he appeared successful. But inwardly, things weren't pretty. So he turned to a trusted mentor for guidance and heard these words: "Ruthlessly eliminate hurry from your life. Hurry is the great enemy of the spiritual life." It wasn't the response he expected, but it was—and continues to be—the answer he needs. Too often we treat the symptoms of toxicity in our modern world instead of trying to pinpoint the cause. A growing number of voices are pointing at hurry, or busyness, as a root of much evil.

Watson's book unfolds a vision and a practical strategy for developing small groups that are much simpler than the typical group, while being more productive and with greater spiritual depth. The Class Meeting is structured into an eight-week study resource designed for a small group to work through together. Along the way, your group will be progressively equipped with a shared language to talk about the work of the Holy Spirit in the inner person and a structure for holding these kinds of meetings. After eight weeks, the book is laid aside and the class meeting is born.
- The Band Meeting, Kevin Watson. The band meeting, a proven discipleship model for growing in love through the accountability of small, same-gender groups, was one of the defining characteristics of the Methodist movement started by John Wesley in the mid-1700s. In reflection on Wesley's class meeting and band meeting structure, George Whitfield once said, "My Brother Wesley acted wisely, the souls that were awakened under his ministry he joined in class, and thus preserved the fruits of his labor. This I neglected, and my people are a rope of sand. In The Band Meeting, Kevin Watson and Scott Kisker give an overview of the richness of this early tradition and introduce a practical approach for growing toward an authentic, transformation-oriented small group experience.
- **Celebration of Discipline**, **Richard Foster.** The book explores the 'classic disciplines' of Christian faith: the inward disciplines of meditation, prayer, fasting, and study; the outward disciplines of simplicity, solitude, submission and service and the corporate disciplines of confession, worship, guidance and celebration. - The Divine Mentor, Wayne Cordeiro. Many believers settle for a spiritual routine that lacks God's presence. But what they truly want, and truly need, is a dynamic, vital, and intimate relationship with God. Here Wayne Cordeiro gently but directly shows readers how to move from routine to relationship--from mundane actions to fresh encounters--by learning to hear Him speak to them through the Bible. Through stories, lessons, and anecdotes, Cordeiro equips readers to listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit as they read God's Word, enabling them to transform their daily quiet time with the Lord. - Invitation to a Journey, Robert Mulholland. In Invitation to a Journey, Mulholland helps Christians new and old understand that we become like Christ gradually, not instantly. Not every personality is suited to an early morning quiet time, so Mulholland frees different personality types to express their piety differently. He reviews the classical spiritual disciplines and demonstrates the importance of undertaking our spiritual journey with (and for the sake of) others.
- A Long Obedience in the Same Direction, Eugene Peterson. Following Jesus requires a deepening life of prayer, and throughout history Christians have learned to pray from the Psalms. Peterson finds particular encouragement for today's pilgrims in the Songs of Ascents (Psalms 120–134). With prophetic and pastoral wisdom, he shows how the psalms teach us to grow in worship, service, joy, work, humility, community, and blessing. This study is available on Amazon.
- **Emotionally Healthy Spirituality, Pete Scazzero.** In this revised best-selling book, Peter Scazzero outlines a road map for discipleship with Jesus that is powerfully transformative. He unveils what's wrong with our current definition of "spiritual growth" and offers not only a model of spirituality that actually works, but seven steps to change that will help you experience authentic faith and hunger for God. Smith helps readers recognize the formative power of culture and the transformative possibilities of Christian practices. He explains that worship is the "imagination station" that incubates our loves and longings so that our cultural endeavors are indexed toward God and his kingdom. - Be Still: A Simple Guide to Quiet Time, Brian Heasley. From memorizing scripture to noticing beauty everywhere, 24-7 Prayer Director Brian Heasley explains that we don't need to be static for our hearts to be still, and how even in the midst of a full, busy life, we can spend quiet time with God. Be Still will change the way you think about prayer and devotion and equip you with all the tools you need to deepen your relationship with God. This study is 5 sessions and is available on Amazon.
- The Imitation of Christ, Tomas a Kempis. This classic of Christian devotional literature has brought understanding and comfort to millions for centuries. Both Protestants and Catholics as well as mystics and historians of religious thought have studied these meditations on the life and teachings of Jesus, finding in them a path to prayer and spiritual guidance. Written in a candid and conversational style, The Imitation of Christ discusses liberation from worldly inclinations, recollection as a preparation for prayer, the consolations of prayer, and the place of eucharistic communion in a devout life.
- Live No Lies, John Mark Comer. We are at war. Not with a foreign government or domestic terrorists or a creepy new artificial intelligence hell-bent on taking over the world. No, it's a war we feel deep inside our own chests: we are at war with lies. The problem isn't so much that we tell lies but that we live them. We let them into our bodies, and they sabotage our peace. All around us in

the culture and deep within our own body memories are lies: deceptive ideas that wreak havoc on our emotional health and spiritual well-being, and deceptive ideas about who God is, who we are, and what the good life truly is. The choice is not whether to fight or not fight, but whether we win or surrender. - The Spirit of the Disciplines, Dallas Willard. In American Saint, John Wigger has written the definitive biography of Asbury and, by extension, a revealing interpretation of the early years of the Methodist movement in America. Asbury emerges here as not merely an influential religious leader, but a fascinating character, who lived an extraordinary life. His cultural sensitivity was matched only by his ability to organize. His life of prayer and voluntary poverty were legendary, as was his generosity to the poor. He had a remarkable ability to connect with ordinary people, and he met with thousands of them as he crisscrossed the nation, riding more than one hundred and thirty thousand miles between his arrival in America in 1771 and his death in 1816. Indeed Wigger notes that Asbury was more recognized face-to-face than any other American of his day, including Thomas Jefferson and George Washington.

John Wesley: A Theological Journey, Ken Collins. John Wesley remains a seminal figure, not only for "the people called Methodist," but also within the larger Protestant tradition. Understanding his theology is a requirement for understanding the development of the Western Christian tradition in the modern period. In recent years much work has been done to grasp the intricacies of Wesley's theology. However, most of this work has been thematic in organization, studying Wesley's thought according to a topical or systematic outline. The weakness of this approach, argues Kenneth J. Collins, is that it fails to demonstrate the evolution and changes of Wesley's theology. What is called for is a historical presentation—one that examines the development of Wesley's theology across the span of his long and eventful theological career. Collins thus provides a chronological presentation of the development of Wesley's theology. Drawing on an extensive examination of the primary sources, and demonstrating an intimate knowledge of the different contexts and social locations in which Wesley's theology took place, John Wesley: A Theological Journey will be necessary reading for anyone wishing to understand the broad scope of the Methodist leader's theological development and contribution.

The end to which they gathered was to describe essential Methodist teachings that can face the challenges posed by cultural, social, and political forces that attempt to subvert the Christian witness and reroute the focus of the Wesleyan community. This resulting work resources a vital and growing Methodism that is founded on the truth of the Christian faith as it has been received (Jude 3). It is our hope that this message of God's self-revelation in the story of Israel and the person of Jesus of Nazareth, of wholeness, of love, and true freedom will be proclaimed by Wesleyan believers for centuries to come.
