Week 1, Day 1 God's Promise Brings Hope

Luke 1:37 For nothing will be impossible with God. (ESV)

When the angel Gabriel spoke these words to Mary, he was speaking truth that every disciple of Jesus needs to hear: God's promises never fail, even when they seem impossible. Think about it – Mary was a young woman from a nowhere town, with no status, no power, no influence. Yet God chose her to carry the Savior of the world. What seemed unthinkable became reality because the word of God is always faithful and true.

Isaiah 25:6-9 On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wine, of rich food full of marrow, of aged wine well refined. 7 And he will swallow up on this mountain the covering that is cast over all peoples, the veil that is spread over all nations. 8 He will swallow up death forever; and the Lord God will wipe away tears from all faces, and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken. 9 It will be said on that day, "Behold, this is our God; we have waited for him, that he might save us. This is the Lord; we have waited for him; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation." (ESV)

John 1:12-13 But to all who believed him and accepted him, he gave the right to become children of God. They are reborn—not with a physical birth resulting from human passion or plan, but a birth that comes from God. (NLT)

The circumstances of our birth vary from person to person. Our economic, cultural, and geographic realities are part of what makes us each unique. What I find fascinating about the circumstances of our birth is that it's something we have absolutely no control over and yet it impacts the rest of our lives.

I was born to a mother who loved me and a father who did not. My life began with a hole where my father was supposed to be. That is, until my mom met the man who would come to love me and adopt me as his own, the man who I have known as my dad as far back as I can remember. Despite the circumstances of my physical birth, which left me fatherless, I am blessed with a father who knows me and loves me not because of biology but because he chose me.

John tells us about a similar situation in the beginning of his gospel. In verse 10 we read that Jesus came into the world he created but was rejected by it. Verse 11 tells us that Jesus was born to his own people, the people of Israel, but they too rejected him. But there were some who believed him and accepted him, not because of their family or heritage, and to those Jesus gave the right to become children of God. To be reborn not as the result of human passion or plan but a new birth that comes from God. This gift of adoption isn't limited by our race, gender, social status, or anything else that separates us from one another.

In this season of Advent may we remember that Jesus has given us the greatest gift: the opportunity to become children of God.





Week 3, Day 5 Courage in the Storm

These past 3 years have not been easy but knowing that God is with me calms my fears.

As we look forward to the birth of Jesus during this Advent season, let us remember that God walks beside us daily. When we release our fear to God, He, in turn, gives us courage and peace for every situation. He turns the impossible into possible and the ordinary into extraordinary. God wants to show up in big ways in our lives. As we pray in faith for courage and strength, we can then watch expectantly for Him to do miraculous things.

Between the Old and New Testament, referred to as the 400 years of Silence, so far as we know, God did not speak—no Scripture was written. Everything was dark and the wait was hard. Could those living in that darkness have ever imagined the Wonderment of Immanuel fulfilled in Jesus the Messiah, or the joy they would find in the Adoration of a King? Could they have imagined the peace from the Intimate Invitation of relationship that He would offer, or the Transformation of their lives if they accepted?

God sent His Son to be with us in all of our chaos to bring peace and joy to the world. So how do we reclaim the wonder of this advent season? The song "O come, O come, Immanuel" verse 6 says it best. "O come O come Bright and Morning Star, and bring us comfort from afar! Dispel the shadows of the night and turn our darkness into light." Receive Jesus; for He is our something in our nothingness, the light that the darkness has not overcome! He is the Wonderment in the WAIT.



Week 4, Day 3 The Suffering of the Servant King

Isaiah 60:1-3 Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. For behold, darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you, and his glory will be seen upon you.
