SILLY RHYME OR THEOLOGICAL TREASURE?

Each holiday season, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" is heard everywhere from shopping malls to television commercials to church functions. Wherever you go, you'll hear about A Partridge in a Pear Tree, Five Golden Rings, and Twelve Drummers Drumming. What does such a song have to do with Christmas and Jesus, "the reason for the season"?

Depending on the sources consulted, the answer is "a lot." In 16th century England under Henry VIII, the reformation of the Christian Church was underway. He banned the Catholic Church and imprisoned or killed practioners.

Christian Education for adults and children grew in importance. Some believe that memory verses like the 12 Days of Christmas and Consider the carol actively determined to the carol actively determined to the consideration of the carol actively determined to the carol active t

were helpful for both Protestant and Catholic families.

Key aspects of the Christian faith were actively debated during the Reformation. The carol that we know today is a product of that time. Take a moment and consider the meaning of each of the 12 Days and the "True Love," God, who gives to all abundantly.

DAY 1 - A partridge in a pear tree: Jesus Christ. Our ultimate gift is Christ symbolically presented as a mother partridge sacrificing her life to protect her helpless children.

> DAY 2 - Two turtledoves. The Old & New Testments together bear witness to God's self-revelation.

> > DAY 3 - Three French Hens are the three virtues of Faith, Hope & Love.

> > > DAY 4 - Four Calling or Collie Birds are the four Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

"JOIN ME FOR THE CHPC HONDURAS MISSION TRIP JUNE 7-14, 2025"

An invitation from Samuel Mock, CHPC Assistant Pastor

Will you and maybe some friends join us for this year's Mission Trip to Honduras in partnership with SonLight Power? Here is an update.

What's the deadline to apply to go? January 15th is recommended.

What will we be doing on the trip?

We share Jesus with people in remote areas of Honduras by providing solar electricity and light in their communities, which are too far for the government to provide.

But I'm not an electrician! Me neither. We have skilled electricians who teach us what to do. if you don't want to do electrical work at all, we have a fun role on our Fiesta team. This team interacts with the local community, plays with the kids, sings songs, and tells them about Jesus similar to a Vacation Bible school.

Where is Honduras? It's a country of Central America situated between Guatemala and El Salvador to the west and Nicaragua to the south and east. The Caribbean Sea washes its northern coast, the Pacific Ocean its narrow southern coast.



Do I need vaccines? I'm not a medical pro. Talk with

your healthcare provider. An up-to-date Tetanus shot is recommended (if you don't have any allergies to the shot). There are also services like Passport Health of Blue Ash that can advise you and provide vaccines as needed.



IT'S A MIRACLE! BE PART OF THE WONDER THIS YEAR.

Total cost of the trip: \$ 2500

What does that cover? Your Airfare, lodging and food while in Honduras, and supplies for our team and our work in the country.

HALF OF THE FUNDS DUE: March 1st PAID IN FULL DEADLINE: May 15 th.

What if I don't have that kind of money? We have scholarships available to help with some of the funds. I will also help you craft a support letter you can send to friends, family, etc. You'll be surprised how God provides for those who seek to do his will. Remember a passport is needed for this trip.

To apply, go to Chpc.org/SLP25. With limited spots on the trip, we will prioritize sign-ups by order of sign-up, relationship to our congregation, and team needs. A guardian must accompany all participants under 18.

If you're selected for the 2025 team, I will notify you via the email you list on your application. Upon notification, you will receive a Submission Form. Sign up and pay a \$500 non-refundable deposit within 14 days to reserve your spot. The deposit will be applied to the \$2500 trip cost.

GIVING THE GIFT OF LIGHT FOR GOD'S GLORY

Our first SonLight Power trip is hard to put into words. It was a wonderful opportunity to be an answered prayer to many, to see God's love transcend language barriers, and experience his blessing as he moved in and through us.

Honduras is a beautiful country full of gracious people with incredible grit. After a day of work, we would celebrate when we turned on the lights for the first time. For us in the States, who turn on lights every day, it is something we don't think twice about. But, providing such light in a community of people in remote areas of Honduras, it is a miracle!

The lights being turned on mean so much more than brighter rooms; it means access to electricity. With the TV we give to the school and power outlets, the school will gain access to advanced curriculums for students, and the students will be able to attend school beyond the elementary school level. Students often need to farm the land during the day, so light allows them to continue their education at night.

Our work will change many lives, and more importantly, it's an open door for our Lord. We tell each community that Jesus sent us, tell them about Jesus, and give them Bibles. Beyond the telling, we show them—Jesus is the light of the world. Whoever follows [him] will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life (John 8:12)."

CHRISTIAN SEXUALITY

FOR ADULTS WHO INFLUENCE YOUNG PEOPLE

The Church Staff and Session invite adults to prayerfully consider joining them on Friday, January 17th (7-8:30 PM) for an overview of what to expect as CHPC embarks on a Christian Sexuality journey together in 2025.

The five-part Christian Sexuality Training (CST) series is initially for adults – parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, coaches, mentors etc.—anyone who is in a role where they can impact the lives of children, youth, and young adults.

Now more than ever, our children need robust, honest, and theologically-rich conversations about sex, sexuality, and gender. This is exactly what the Christian Sexuality Training provides. The hope is to involve a broad group of adults to experience and evaluate the training before unrolling it in the Fall for young people.

Session members spent four months at the beginning of 2024 studying this series together and doing the hard work of ensuring that what we present to you has been examined both theologically and psychologically from a counseling perspective. Now we are ready to share this with adults within CHPC. We realize this may stir a host of emotions and responses, which is why we are sharing the series overview and a Q&A session on January 17. We are grateful for your consideration!

The Church has always struggled to address questions related to gender and sexuality with truth and grace. That challenge has increase exponentially in today's culture. Children are growing up in a world far different from anything we've seen before, and this difference compounds the challenge of helping them embrace the beauty of God's intention for sexual expression. Our children are constantly bombarded with messages about who they are (gender) and who they desire (sexuality).

By the time they begin hearing from trusted adults or the church about God's vision for sex and gender, they've already been bathed in a pool of competing (and sometimes destructive) ideas. How will the Church disciple through these challenges? It's not enough to just quote Bible verses at our youth, or to give a one-off message on sexuality and gender. We need to show them how beautiful the Creator's vision for human flourishing really is, so that they will not only believe it—but desire it!

12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

SILLY RHYME OR THEOLOGICAL TREASURE?

DAY 5 - Five Golden Rings refers to the Torah or Law, the first five book of the Old Testament which give the history of humanity's sinful failure and God's response of grace to his creation and redemption to/for a people to be a light to the world.

DAY 6 - Six Geese-a-Laying - Six days of creation before God's rest on the seventh day. "Laying down" on the Sabbath restores us to grow in love of God and love of neighbor.

DAY 7 - Seven Swans a-Swimming represented the sevenfold Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophecy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Giving, Leadership, and Mercy—1 Cor. 12:8-10, Eph. 4:7-13, and Rom. 12:3-8.

DAY 8 - The Eight Maids a-Milking are the eight Beatitudes taught by Christ in Matthew 5:3-10. (1) Blessed are the poor in spirit, (2) those who mourn, (3) the meek, (4) those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, (5) the merciful, (6) the pure in heart, (7) the peacemakers, (8) those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake.

DAY 9 - Nine Ladies Dancing are nine choirs of angels and nine fruits of the Holy Spirit-Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.

DAY 10 - Ten Lords a-Leaping are the 10 Commandments in Exodus 20:1-17: (1) You shall have no other gods before me, (2) Do not make an idol, (3) Do not take God's name in vain, (4) Remember the Sabbath Day, (5) Honor your father and mother, (6) Do not murder, (7) Do not commit adultery, (8) Do not steal, (9) Do not bear false witness, (10) Do not covet.

DAY 11 - Eleven Pipers Piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples who "piped" (declared) the faith in an unbroken tradition: Peter, Andrew, James, John, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, Thomas, James (son of Alphaeus), Jude, and



Simon the Zealot were faithful to Jesus until their deaths.

DAY 12 - Twelve Drummers Drumming are the twelve beliefs in the Apostle's Creed: (1) I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. ,(2) I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, (3) He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary, (4) He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell (the grave). (5) On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, (6) He will come again to judge the living and

the dead, (7) I believe in the Holy Spirit, (8) the holy catholic Church, (9) the communion of saints, (10) the forgiveness of sins, (11) the resurrection of the body, (12) and life everlasting.

TO "or" OF

As I was researching the 12 Days of Christmas, I also discovered a not-to-subtle shift in the use of the carol. It was developed as a vital memory device for Christians of all ages. Today, it has been trivialized and treated as a "silly rhyme."

Originally, the text represented a key part of the Church's liturgical calender —the 12 days of celebrations between Christmas (Christ's birthday December 25th) and Epiphany (January 6th), the celebration of the Magi bringing gifts to Jesus.

In today's market-driven environment, the carol serves as a countdown *TO* Christmas, rather than a theological treasure leading *FROM* Christmas to eternity.

NEW YEAR'S GIFTS

As we welcome the New Year 2025, let us consider the nature of our personal relationship with Jesus Christ—"Our True Love...the Giver of Good Gifts." Is the relationship superficial (based on a silly rhyme) or is it rooted in real theological treasure that enables his lovers to grow in grace and truth for the whole year.

If you do the math in the carol, you'll find that by the end of the 12th day of Christmas, you will have received 364 gifts from your "true love," Jesus. That's one for each day for the rest of the year. Amazing!



PREACHING SERIES FOR THE NEW YEAR

Jan. 5, 2025—WAITING WITHOUT A TRACKING NUMBER Matthew 2:1-12

On this 12th Day of Christmas the last sermon of the *Worth the Wait* series will be preached. The Magi actively waited on God's movement by watching the stars and deciphering the messages of the heavens. As we keep our hearts and minds open to God's voice we, too, will hear from him. He will lead us to himself because of his power, brilliance, and love.

A CLEAR RESOLUTION – FOCUSING ON OUR COMMITMENTS & WHO WE ARE

In the remainder of the January preaching series, we will focus on our commitments as covenant partners at College Hill Presbyterian Church. We don't have members at CHPC, we have "covenant partners."

Covenants are a central theme of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation, particularly God's loving "covenant" with his creation. The word is a fancy way of saying we make promises together to honor God as a Christian community. We are not customers or clients; we are partners with God and one another, committed to demonstrating to the world how God has created us to live. We covenant with each other to be led by the Holy Spirit in our lives so that we grow to love like Jesus.

We make a common commitment to Presbyterian principles and Reformed theological distinctives. We agree to pursue a common vision: "We honor God by growing a diverse community of Jesus followers." In our lives together, we continually encourage and challenge one another to love God

and our neighbor with our heads, hearts, and hands. We cannot do this on our own. We need one another as partners on this journey.

This sermon series will be an overview of our "Partnership class." which presents our common commitments for those seeking to follow Jesus at CHPC. This will provide a clear resolution of our common commitments - a reminder of what we have agreed to observe as Covenant Partners. As we enter 2025, we will focus our attention on what God has called us to do as part of his church at College Hill Presbyterian.

Jan. 12—WHAT IS A PRESBYTERIAN?

I Corinthians 12:1-11, I Tim. 3:1-7, 14-16

This Sunday we are ordaining our new officers - elders and deacons - which is a hallmark of the Presbyterian Church. The word *Presbyterian* is derived from the Greek word for elder. The Covenant Partners elect elders from the congregation who will lead the church according to God's plan and purpose (in contrast to someone outside the church choosing the leaders). As Presbyterians, we are not only connected to one another as Covenant Partners, we are also connected to other Presbyterian churches. We work together for the Kingdom of God individually and corporately.

(organizational principles) and Reformed theology (beliefs about God). We all have a theology because we all have beliefs about God. The core Reformed theological principle is that God is the one who is in control. God is sovereign. God is God all by himself. Who we are as Christians and who we are as a church flows from the character and promises of God as revealed in Scripture.

Jan. 25—God's Gifts—Ephesians 2:1-10

Reformed Theology states that we know we are made right with God by Jesus Christ's death and resurrection. The Scriptures teach that we are reconciled with God by God's gift of grace through Jesus, in whom we place our total faith for God's glory. All Christians are saved because of Christ by grace through faith for the glory of God, all of which is taught in the Bible.
