We do not know much about this man Levi. We do not know about his

background, his personality, or what he was thinking when Jesus walked by. All we are told is that he was a tax collector. Tax collectors were not popular. Apparently, they have never been ... Mark's Gospel focuses on the theme of discipleship. From the beginning to the end, it's about what it means to be called by and to follow Jesus Christ. And here at the outset where Jesus calls his first disciple, you would think there would be more details or some sort of explanation as to why Levi follows Jesus.

But the text is silent. It offers no explanation. Nothing.

WHAT MATTERS HERE IS NOT SO MUCH THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF THOSE WHO ARE CALLED, BUT THE POWER AND AUTHORITY OF THE ONE WHO CALLS. It's not primarily about the moral, spiritual, or psychological conditions of those who are called. It's about the power and authority of Him who calls, the power and authority of Jesus Christ. That's what's essential.... Once we know Him as the Lord. He gives us all sorts of answers—more than most of us want! But until we know He's Lord, we don't know the

well-known tax collector named Levi. Sources say that he told Levi to follow him, and similar to others that he told Levi to follow him, and similar to others we've seen recently, Levi left everything behind and followed him. Later in the evening, Jesus was seen at the home of Levi where a great banquet was being held in his honor. Many other tax collectors and "sinners' were in attendance, which drew the attentions of local Pharisees. When questioned about his company, Jesus explained the sick don't need a doctor; just as he has not come to call the righteous, but sinners to reportance.

right questions – about Him, about ourselves, or just about anything of importance. But knowing He's the Lord changes everything.

The scribes of the Pharisees were upset not only because Jesus ate with Levi and other tax collectors. Levi had not yet shown any signs of repentance—no confession or contrition, no sackcloth or ashes, no rending of garments or outward signs of penance. Nothing. Thus,

the scribes of the Pharisees were skeptical. They likely felt Levi's life deserved a bit more scrutiny. More attention to his moral and spiritual condition was needed. They wanted


> to see the audit—some sort of moral and spiritual audit —before they could accept his so-called "conversion."

We ought not be surprised. After all, he had probably ripped some of them off. So, the demand for evidence—at least some credible preliminary signs of repentance—is understandable. It's natural. Indeed, it's not only natural. It is the way of religion. Most religions have a process, a method, or system of rituals or exercises for people to express or demonstrate repentance—a change of heart and mind.

The Protestant Reformers of the sixteenth century—all of them—rejected these penitential exercises, this elaborate process of repentance and declared that we are saved by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone. They said true repentance IS A CONSEQUENCE OF, NOT A PRE-REQUISITE FOR FAITH. THEY SAID WE ARE SAVED BECAUSE OF WHAT CHRIST

centuries. He spoke Italian (his parents' language) and seven others, plus Latin, Biblical Hebrew, and Biblical Greek—the essentials of biblical studies.

But often it was what Francis didn't do that amazed. He didn't live in a "papal cocoon"—the Pope's 12-room Vatican apartment. He chose one room in a Vatican guesthouse. From there he could leave and be with "the people"— especially those in need—the suffering, the grieving, and the poor anywhere.

He used technology to share Christ's love. For example, shortly after he became Pope, he joined more than 3 million in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil World Youth Day. The jumbotrons on the beach enabled him to bring Christ's message of hope to whole new generations—and they loved him for it.

Since Easter, it's likely that you've seen hundreds of photos of Jorge Bergoglio, who died Easter Monday, April 21st at the age of 88. Most know him as Pope Francis I. The picture above captured my attention—a simple man—bare-headed, and dressed in a plain 33-button cassock.

In 2013, he was chosen Pope on the 5th ballot. That day he greeted huge crowds with, "Good evening." Instead of dispensing papal blessing, he humbly asked people to *pray for him*. The former janitor, high school teacher, and club bouncer continually departed from tradition. No fancy robes or red slippers. for

him.

soccer club and plain black shoes.

He was Argentine, the first non-European Pope for almost 13





He loved them and it showed. He lived "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for



the kingdom of God belongs to such as these" MARK 10:14.

Many of his colleagues could not

understand his denial of privilege nor his passion to "be with people and *feel* their real needs" even at

personal sacrifice.

On the day he died, the Pope rose early



and, in his last moments on earth, FaceTimed with Catholics sheltered in one of the few remaining churches in Gaza. Since 10/7/23 when Hamas invaded Israel, he had phoned them daily at 7 AM to encourage them in their faith and humbly asked for their prayers.

On Easter Monday, April 21, 2025, The Vatican announced


"Dearest brothers and sisters, with deep sorrow I must announce the death of our Holy Father Francis.At 7.35 AM this morning, the Bishop of Rome, Francis, returned to the house of the Father. His entire life was devoted to service to the Lord and His Church.

He taught us to live the values of the Gospel with fidelity, courage, and universal love, especially in favour of the poorest and most marginalized. With immense gratitude for his example as a true disciple of the Lord Jesus, we commend the soul of Pope Francis to the infinite, merciful love the One and Triune God."

A chaplain is to be a calming presence as they meet with those who are suffering. Christ's disciple Peter taught us to "be clear-minded and self-controlled so that [we] can pray. Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:7b-8). Somehow that calming presence of God's Spirit is received by hurting people, and it helps.

I was invited to minister to a woman who had a surgical procedure and was just coming out of anesthesia. She was moaning loudly, crying out, and also shouting at the medical people who were trying to help her. So, I began to pray as I went to her bedside. I introduced myself, ignored her behavior, and began to stroke her arm. I murmured softly to her that God loves her and that He's with her. I didn't do anything drastic or say anything

particularly wise. But as my calm and quiet presence was near her, and I invited the Spirit to minister to her, she quieted a bit. She never totally settled, but she seemed to become a bit more comfortable and less miserable.

The medical staff later told me that she had a prescription drug dependence, and they believed that her actions were part of her attempt to get more pain medication.

I don't know, perhaps God is the only one who really knows, but I do know that person was in pain—even though I am not certain of what kind of pain. God knows and loves her. My job isn't to judge or really understand—just to be the calming and healing presence of the Divine with people.

And don't we each have our pain place? A tragedy in our past, a bitter defeat, disappointments,

sickness, loss.
This world is full
of all kinds of
opportunities for
pain, and it is the
Divine within each
of us as believers
in Jesus who can
minister the balm
of God Almighty as
we "live and move
and have our
being" (Acts 17:28
NIV).

One night as I was meeting with a patient and her husband. A nurse interrupted us. She asked that I follow her to be with a different family whose their loved one had died very suddenly. The plan had been to move the woman to hospice care the next day. Instead, she died while her family was visiting. They were shocked, disappointed, and angry. Those first moments as they dealt with their new reality after their loved one passed from this life to the next were rough.

It wasn't eloquence or great wisdom that they needed. Silently, I focused on the peaceful, calm assurance of who I am in Jesus Christ. In a situation that doesn't seem very peaceful, as a Chaplain I have the privilege of reflecting Christ to those in need. It is his calming presence that makes a difference for people whether or not they know him. I have a "front row seat" as God helps those who mourn breathe a little deeper, relax, and keep going— as he did over 2000 years ago.

This retreat is designed for parents and youth to explore the "What IF" moments of life—our fears, doubts.

Lex Bowerman, the Events Coord. for the CHPC Family Ministry Team, reports on a similar retreat held in April. It was shared

by students, adult leaders, and counselors/interns from Living Hope Counseling Services.

The focus was on "What If?" — Trusting God with our thoughts & feelings. The group explored how God helps us navigate big feelings and tough thoughts. The group learned how God's truth can replace fear and anxiety with courage and peace. The two Key Scripture Verses were "Do not be anxious about anything..." (Philippians 4:6–7) and "We take captive every thought..." (2nd Corinthians 10:5).

Students participated in indoor and outdoor group activities, character-building lessons, and reflected on their God-given superpowers: the unique gifts God placed in them to serve and shine. Students went home with their very own "character cape," a powerful reminder of their worth and purpose in Christ!

WHAT STUDENTS SAID ABOUT THE TIME: "I didn't know I could talk about this stuff with God" and "I liked learning how to stop my mind from racing."

DID FOR US on the cross. by Christ's righteousness, which he imputes or reckons to us, and we receive not by works or merit, or by cooperating with God's grace—BUT PURELY AND SIMPLY AS A GIFT, A GIFT OF GRACE.

I once had a student who was shocked to hear this. He said: "In my church you gotta get folk lost before you get'em found. You gotta make 'em feel bad before you make 'em feel good. You gotta make 'em feel guilty, needy, desperate, or insecure before you can convince 'em they need a Savior. You gotta turn up the heat and make 'em squirm so the Lord can save 'em and then straighten 'em out."

Sure, you and I can change in some ways by conditioning ourselves. We can lay down the law for others and even for ourselves and demand compliance. And I do not suggest circumstances may not require it. We may even get results. We may even be successful in modifying the behavior of others or our own. But such measures will never truly change anyone's heart or mind. They will never yield true repentance because true repentance, the Bible teaches, is a gift of grace.

[The Apostle] Paul says, but only "godly grief" leads to repentance (2 Cor. 7:10f). True repentance comes only as a consequence of knowing, first and last, that we are loved by God. Grace comes first. Love comes first. That is why [John] Calvin says, "Repentance not only follows faith, but is also born of faith." Calvin then adds this remarkable claim: "There are

When questioned about his company, Jesus explained the sick don't need a doctor, just as he has not come to call the righteous, but sinners to

some, however, who suppose that repentance precedes faith, rather than flows from it or is produced by it as fruit from a tree. Such persons have never known the power of repentance."Thus, for Calvin, the power of repentance is born of grace, flows from grace, and is fueled by grace.

True repentance, Scripture teaches, is a gift. It does not come as a consequence of hitting rock bottom; discovering our true needs or limits, the depths of our misery, despair, or depravity. And it certainly does not occur by being shamed or threatened with punishment. It comes by encountering the love of the Lord Jesus, just as Levi did. It comes by encountering the power and authority of Jesus Christ...[and] takes a miracle—the miracle of God's grace. It comes as a consequence of knowing that we belong to God and are loved by God.

Repentance in the New Testament is not so much a matter of sackcloth and ashes as it is joy and celebration. This is also why repentance so often leads immediately to parties or celebrations. Yes, I said parties! ... Many look at Presbyterians and say we are party-challenged, party-inhibited, lacking

in celebratory spirit. It is not true. It is a caricature. We can have parties— "decently and in order," of course! . . . But we celebrate by giving glory to God, by praising God, and by living a life of gratitude. We celebrate "by glorifying God and enjoying him forever." which means the Christian life is not about striving to earn our salvation—or even about our salvation at all! It's about responding in gratitude to God for his grace and mercy! . . . Yes, there is still striving. Yes, there is still

work. But for those who have experienced "the power of repentance" that Calvin talks about, the motivation is completely different.

So what's the point? The point is parties are appropriate. Parties celebrating God's grace and mercy, the forgiveness of sins, and our callings, the fellowship we have in Christ, God's "Yes" to us in Jesus Christ—such celebrations are entirely in order. In fact, if we don't celebrate such occasions, there likely is something wrong with us and our critics are right to call us smug, dour, or "the frozen chosen."

Yet, the New Testament does not suggest the Christian life is simply a perpetual party. No, the Christian life includes work, plenty of work. Have you noticed how often in the New Testament Jesus gives people something to do immediately after meeting them? Jesus tells the paralytic. "My son, your sins are forgiven. Take up your pallet and go home." He tells Levi, "Follow me." Few people meet Jesus in the New Testament without being given something to do. The Christian life is not just about justification or sanctification. It is also about vocation . . . [Following Jesus as LORD!]



Before those who followed Jesus were called Christians, they were called followers of the Way. This is because Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth and the life.
