THE GIFT of HOPE

THE BEST CHRISTMAS PRESENT EVER!

I recently read an article about a group who set out to figure out how much it would cost to give the gifts in the classic Christmas song, "The 12 Days of Christmas." Apparently, this group has been doing this for years to figure out the state of the economy. And what they found might surprise you. The cost of the dozen gifts rang in at an all-time record of \$46,729.86. Some of the items seemed affordable, like a partridge in a pear

tree, which goes for \$319. Two turtle doves come in at \$750. Three French Hens would cost \$330. But the price really goes up when you get to seven swans-a-swimming which comes in at \$13,125. Ten Lords-a-leaping, will cost you \$14,539.20 (not sure where you would find those, but apparently its expensive). Musicians can be expensive, so it's no shock that eleven pipers piping cost \$3,207.38 and twelve drummers drumming is \$3,468.02. Overall, the real

message of Christmas is not in the gifts that we give to each other. It's a reminder of the gift that God has given to each of us. It is the only gift that truly keeps on giving, so I want to give you reminders about God's gift to us.

First: it's surprising. When Christmas rolls around, you might try to figure out if certain people have bought that gift you really wanted. Maybe you already know what they bought, because they didn't hide it very well. Or maybe you

uncovered it by accident when you looked at the credit card statement for the month. But when the day comes, and you open your present, you have to pretend you're surprised. But all along, you knew what the gift was. God's gift to us came as a complete surprise to everyone. It was not expected, and as you examine it more carefully, you realize how great a gift it was.

Second: God's gift came to us in the humblest of wrappings. What would you think if you saw a gift wrapped in newspaper and string under your tree? At first, you might think that your husband forgot about where the wrapping paper was (sorry, guys). But think about God's gift to us. Jesus was not born in a palace of gold, but rather a simple stable. He was clothed with rags. He was laid in a feeding trough. These things do not, in any way, diminish the story of Jesus' birth, but help us to realize that Jesus is accessible to all.

Third: we don't deserve this gift. At Christmas, we give gifts to those whom we care about, who have been kind to us over the past year, or who have given us a gift first. We don't typically give gifts to people who have slandered our name, or to the angry neighbor who never has a kind word to say. Yet God gave His gift while we were still His enemies. He didn't give this gift to us because we deserved it. The Bible says, "But God demonstrated His love for us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

Last but not least, the gift tells us something about the giver. When you want to give someone a gift, you start thinking about it ahead of time. Hopefully, you try to find what the person wants or needs. When God decided to give us the gift of eternal life, it wasn't something that He just stumbled into. Long before there was a town called Bethlehem, a garden called Eden, or even a place called Earth, a decision was made that God would send forth his Son, born of a woman, made under the law, to redeem those under the law. The Bible says that "He was slain from the foundation of the world." (Revelation 13:8) Make no mistake about it: this gift that God has given to us was the most sacrificial thing He could have ever given.

So, Christmas isn't about those gifts that you put under the tree. We may put stock in the things we have or the gifts that we give, but all those things will pass away. Life is about knowing the God who made you, and who has given you the greatest gift you will ever receive. Life is about knowing Jesus and what He has done for you. So, come hear the Good News once again. Join us for a special service of Carols and Songs on December 19th. Join us as we celebrate God's great gift to us Christmas Eve at 1 or 3 PM for our Contemporary Christmas Eve Service, or at 5 or 7 PM for our Traditional Christmas Eve service. We will celebrate our Savior's birth again on Christmas Day at a 9 am Worship Service. And by the way – you don't have to be afraid to share this gift with others. Invite a friend to join you as we celebrate the greatest gift of all, Jesus.

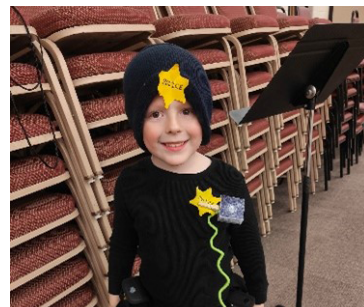
SUNDAY SCHOOL

We all have a story. Within those stories, there are chapters that are filled with wonderful tales and adventures. These chapters are fun to tell and easy to spin. Other chapters are filled with hardship and shame. These chapters are hard to tell, and are often told with downcast eyes and tears. They are hard to walk through. It may be a time of loneliness and brokenness. Sometimes, we get stuck in our hardship and shame, and don't know how to move through the valley of the shadow. We need help.

Love INC's Connection Center is the place where such chapters unfold. Our Intake Specialists listen and calmly breathe hope and life into our neighbors' stories, so that the chapter can be turned and a new ending can be written. As each neighbor shares with an intake specialist, HOPE is ignited. A relationship has begun that will transform a life.

One of our neighbors has a story that is a perfect example of a chapter turned and the hope of a new ending. This gentleman called us, brand new to Sheboygan. He is a veteran and disabled. Pain would rack his body every day. He needed furniture. We listened to his story and met his need of furniture. The Furniture Ministry Team sat with him, listened, prayed, and gave him a bible. The next week, he called us letting us know that he would be going to rehab for his pain medication addiction. The love and compassion of the volunteers he interacted with encouraged him to begin to change his story.

Our Neighbor Liaisons continued to call and check on this man weekly. He was depressed and lonely. He was off the narcotic pain killers, but still was in pain. Volunteers also sent him encouragement cards. We continued to love on him. He struggled with God. We prayed with him.

One day, we heard a plot twist. Our neighbor began to read the bible again. He watched church online. He prayed. The Holy Spirit was on the move. He began to see the goodness of God in his life. The last time we talked with him, we found out that he is engaged to a lovely woman who wants to join her story with his. He feels he has a purpose, not only to follow God, but to become a good husband and serve others. He said that his life has new meaning and is grateful to Love INC for supporting him while he turned the chapter and wrote a new ending to his story.

The heart and soul of Love INC are relationships with our neighbors. What a joy to see and hear the wonderful things God does as we love our neighbors!

NOVEMBER COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER UPDATE: Christina Zeuner submitted a report to Council sharing enrollment information. Childcare currently doesn't have openings until March. Staffing information was also shared. This year's fundraiser raised about \$3,000. This money is used for field trips, classroom parties, graduation and new toys and educational materials.

2025-26 ECC TUITION RATES: The Council discussed various changes for tuition rates for next year. 4K will remain at \$170 and Preschool will be raised to \$110. Childcare will be increased January 2026 to \$5.75/hour.

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN: The Council approved the Feed My Starving Children MobilePack to be held October 9-11, 2025.

COLUMBARIUM PRESENTATION: The Columbarium Team led the council through a power point describing the project's scope and financial details. Discussion followed. The Council approved recommending the plan as presented to the Congregation.

ELDER TEAM: John reported details from the most recent elder meeting.

WALK IN ITEM - FINANCIAL DISCUSSION: Michelle Zuengler and Donna Felch met with Brad Ten Pas regarding various ideas. He suggested more graphic financial reporting at Congregation Meetings, which we will try at our meeting later this evening. He felt most people don't understand all the numbers. He also feels we should monitor attendance as that can lead to trends in giving. He also suggested forming a financial committee to look at other financial instruments to grow funds for big projects, such as the parking lot. While we do not use the stock market as an investment option, there maybe lower risk options for some of our long-term projects. Donna will look into this further. He also suggested we do more long-term capital planning which is a good suggestion and will be implemented.
