BELIEF BEYOND A DOUBT!

"Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed.'"

— John 20:29

Thank God for Thomas! I say that deliberately. Praise God for Thomas, one of Jesus' disciples who was a witness to Jesus after He rose from the dead. As you may recall, Thomas is one of Jesus' followers who has been given the unfortunate name, "Doubting Thomas."

"Doubt," however, may be too light a word to describe Thomas' refusal to believe his fellow disciples when they told him they had seen the risen Jesus. He flat-out refused to believe unless he could see the marks of the nails in Jesus' hands and touch the place where those nails pierced his Savior—along with the wound from the spear that had been thrust into His side.

I've always liked Thomas. Maybe it's because he was the one who asked clarifying questions throughout Jesus' ministry. Maybe it's because I admire his boldness and willingness to follow Jesus even in the face of danger (albeit short-lived, of course). Or maybe it's because of this powerful scene that took place a week after that first Easter Sunday, when Jesus showed Himself to Thomas:

John writes:

"Eight days later, his disciples were inside again, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood

among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here, and see my hands; and put out your hand, and place it in my side. Do not disbelieve, but believe.'"

— John 20:26–27

What would Thomas say when the risen Jesus appeared to him? What would this doubter—this man who refused to believe his friends when they said Jesus was alive—have to say? The only thing he could say when he came face-to-face with his risen Lord and Savior:

"Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!'" - John 20:28

There was no room left for doubt. There was no room left for disbelief. All Thomas could do was beautifully confess who Jesus is and acknowledge the Good News that broke forth on that first Easter morning: **Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Hallelujah!**

Jesus then says something truly remarkable about the faith of future believers—like you and me! We hear in John's Gospel:

"Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed.'" — John 20:29

Who are those who "have not seen and yet have believed?" You! Me! Although we have not "seen" Jesus in the same way Thomas did, we believe. We believe through faith—faith given to us as a gift by the Holy Spirit in the waters of Holy Baptism. *Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Hallelujah!*

This doesn't mean, however, that we don't see Jesus at all. Far from it! As we gather as Easter people here at St. Paul, we do see Jesus at work in our congregation:

- We see Jesus shaping the hearts and minds of our littlest learners in our Early Childhood Center and among children connected to our Children and Family Ministry.
- We see Jesus forming our youth into young Christian leaders through Youth Ministry and Confirmation.
- We witness Jesus making a difference in the lives of our guests attending the Gathering Place, and those in our community through ministries like Love INC, Celebrate Recovery, and St. Paul Serves.
- We partner with other congregations in the name of Jesus by supporting Lutheran education—through Lutheran High and numerous K–8 Lutheran schools in the greater Sheboygan area.

We see Jesus as He comes to us, week in and week out, in worship.

We witness Jesus welcoming children and adults alike through the waters of Holy Baptism. We encounter Jesus as He physically comes to us in, with, and under the bread and wine of the Lord's Supper—offering us His body and His blood.

As we see Jesus at work at St. Paul, we can join in and confess the same faith Thomas exclaimed when he saw Jesus: "My Lord and my God!" And as we share this faith, we too can help others "see" Jesus as we live out our shared mission of connecting people to Christ. Come and see!

On this National Day of Prayer, we pray:


- · For repentance and renewal in our hearts, our homes, and our nation.

APRIL CONGREGATION MEETING MINUTES

MARCH 2025 TREASURER'S REPORT: Donna Felch presented the financial reports. Nine months into the year we have a deficit of \$59,992. Giving is 2% lower than last year at this time and significantly lower than budget, which is concerning. Expenses are underbudget by over \$48,000, which is good. The Council will be sending a letter to all members to create awareness that the decrease in giving will have an impact on next year's budget and ministry as we move into the future. Dedicated accounts were reviewed and are strong, as a reminder these are earmarked for specific things and cannot be used for the operating budget. The Endowment fund has had significant growth.

NOMINATING TEAM: Thank you to those that served on the nominating team this year: Donna Felch, Michael Timm, Nicole Dollevoet & Jake Baus.

Columbarium Update: Excavation is scheduled for May 5, the units are in Chicago ready for us. We have sold 11 niches and have at least 2 more sales anticipated this week.

APRIL CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER UPDATE: Christina Zeuner submitted a report. It was a fun school year with several special activities, including chapel, field trips, grandparents day, etc. The last day of school is May 20/21, with 4K graduation on May 21. Both Tammy Rajer and Christina will return in fall. Current enrollment for next year is 3AM -13, 3PM - 4 and 4K-15.

Our maximum per class is 16, so we have room at the moment. Summer childcare has 23 enrolled on a regular basis, with 2 full time and 1-3 part time spots still available. 15 of those children will return in fall, with several new children as well. The outdoor summer program is a huge hit and will be held June 2-August 22. Weather permitting, children are outside the entire day other than for bathroom breaks, lunch and rest.

MARCH TREASURER REPORT: Average weekly giving has dropped 2% below last year's giving. This has not happened in recent memory. Attendance is steady with a slight increase, so that is not the problem. Expenses continue to remain underbudget, which is good as the majority of expenses are fixed. March had five Sundays, which did improve the bottom line over last month. A letter will be sent to the Congregation to bring further awareness to the decline in giving.

FRONT OFFICE PROJECT: Last month the Council approved the carpet replacement. We now approved \$11,000 for the reception furniture replacement. The current furniture was used when

installed over 30 years ago. It has exhausted its useful life and is literally falling apart. Purchase funded by the Capital Improvement Fund, which has over \$359,000 and has been designated for such purposes.

WORSHIP CENTER CONDENSER: The Worship Center condenser had damage over 8 years ago but has continued to function. There now have been multiple changes in coolant, which has outdated our system. In 18 months the cost went up almost 50%. The Council feels we need to move forward with this project before costs go up even more and they will present it to the Congregation at the June Meeting.

Three quotes were sought. Schaus Mechanical from Manitowoc was selected with a quote of \$67,801. Stefanie will follow up with Schaus Mechanical to ensure they can hold pricing until our June Congregation Meeting.

ELDER TEAM REPORT: John Rische reported that the Elder Team reviewed the 6th Commandment. They discussed worship attendance, which has seen a slight increase. They also approved the Funeral Policy, which the Council will review in May.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT: Holy Week and Easter went very well. Attendance was the highest it has been since before COVID, with over 2,000 people. The Cantata on Friday evening worked well and will happen again next year. It was suggested that we have continuous communion during the first service on Sunday morning.

Pr Kyle has called all members over the age of 75 that haven't attended in quite a while. A couple of these are now on the shut-in list. Due to the Pastor vacancy last summer, he was unable to work through the list of non-attenders, so he is doing that now. There are 236 people that received non-attendance letters two years ago and still have not attended. Those members will be removed. There are an additional 97 members that have not been here in three years and will now receive an inactive letter, encouraging them to attend. Pastor encourages all members to be aware of those around you, if there is someone you haven't seen in worship in a while, reach out to them. We have had 1500 unique individuals attend since the beginning of the year, which is very good.

St. Paul Serves has 167 people signed up with 89 new volunteers from last year. The wrap up brat fry has over 130 people registered. We shift to our summer schedule of 2 services beginning May 18.

WALK IN ITEM – WATER BREAK RECAP: The final cost of our water break emergency is \$15,628. No mold was found in our insulation. No insurance claim will be filed, as it does not exceed our deductible and it would only impact our renewal rates.

WALK IN ITEM – OPEN HOUSE WEEKEND: It was suggested to have an Open House weekend, where we advertise it to the community, inviting people to attend. The Director Team will discuss this further.

WALK IN – 11 AM SUNDAY SERVICE FEEDBACK: Attendance averages around 80 people, which could be absorbed in other services, but does help alleviate the 9:30 service. We plan to bring back the service in Fall. There is a continued need for ushers and communion server, especially for that service.

WALK IN – CAMERA ISSUE: Maundy Thursday we had a power supply fail on our camera system. Fortunately we were able to get it repaired on Friday before services. There were also issues

getting software downloaded due to the security on our network. We will add the Camera System to the capital improvement long range plan, as it is beginning to age. Stefanie will talk with Pros4Tech to see if access can be given to a staff member for emergency instances that occur off hours.
