



WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Isaiah 35:1–10 The desert will blossom; God's people will return with joy.
- Psalm 146:5–10 The maker of heaven and earth gives justice and reigns forever.
- or Luke 1:46–55 *Mary rejoices in God, who helps the poor and lifts up the lowly.*
- James 5:7–10 *Be patient; have courage; the coming of the Lord is near.*
- Matthew 11:2–11 *Jesus praises John, the messenger who has prepared the way.*

MUSIC NOTES

Our service opens with the sixth of eight piano pieces found in Opus 76 collection by beloved Romantic composer Johannes Brahms. The title *Intermezzo* alludes to the traditional genre of a short instrumental piece used to break up acts of an opera or other longer musical work. As with other similar piano works, Brahms creates an expressive yet meditative mood, creating a delicate melody that glides effortlessly upon a flowing texture underneath. Today's guest pianist is Hayden Miller, a pianist from Houston who is currently studying at the Royal Academy of Music in London. We welcome him to St. Philip this morning and thank him for his contribution to today's Advent service.

Cantate Domino is an ancient Christian text drawn from Psalm 95 that has been set to music in both the original Latin and the English translation ("Sing to the Lord a new song") by composers for centuries. On this third Sunday of Advent, often referred to as "Gaudate" or "rejoice" Sunday, we offer the opening stanza from the 17th century to reflect the "good tidings of great joy" promised in the awaited Christ child. Characteristic of the day, the choir sings in mostly a homophonic style—divided harmony in unison rhythm—with the text organized in groups of three.

Turning again to the Psalms, today's **anthem** text is drawn from Psalm 24:7 – a call to all people to open their

hearts for the "King of glory." Welsh composer William Mathias infuses jubilant anticipation into the text through a rhythmic vitality in both choir and organ parts, while putting in contrast the declarations of "lift up your heads" with the searching question of "who is this King of glory?" Similarly, today's **offertory**, the third movement and weekly installment from Vivaldi's *Gloria*, RV 589, features a spritely duet full of energy. Drawn from another ancient Christian text, this section embodies joyous praise through playful banter between soloists organized and enhanced by repeated instrumental interludes.

In early 1931 Hugo Distler became organist of the Jakobikirche in Lübeck. Four years later, he composed an organ partita on the Advent chorale *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme* ("Sleepers, Wake" at No. 349 in *Glory to God*). Considered by many his finest work for the organ, this set of variations exemplifies Distler's Neo-Baroque compositional aesthetic in its intricate yet dancelike counterpoint, rhythmic vitality, and fidelity to Philipp Nicolai's chorale tune. In figuration as well as general mood, its three movements illustrate the distinct messages of the chorale's three verses, which bid us (in order) to wake up, listen carefully, and rejoice. The Toccata, today's **closing voluntary**, is its first movement.
