



#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available, just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats, just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

Each year during the Advent and Christmas season, we lift up past, present, and future leaders of the church through our communion offering. #### **MUSIC NOTES**

This morning's **organ voluntaries** are settings of the German chorale melody "Freu dich sehr, o meine Seele" ("Rejoice, O My Soul"), a tune that also appears in the Calvinist tradition as Genevan 42, to which we sing the hymn text "Comfort, Comfort Now my People" (Glory to God No. 87). Bach student Johann Ludwig Krebs made a name for himself as an organ virtuoso in the mid 18th century, with chorale fantasies and free works that give free reign to galant-style counterpoint. His fantasy on "Freu dich sehr" frames its highly decorated melody with an elaborate ritornello. The chorale-based works of Georg Böhm, by contrast, represent an older style of organ composition, one less concerned with elegant turns of phrase and more devoted to motivically based counterpoint.

On this second Sunday of Advent, we reflect the theme of peace through music in several ways. The German carol "Es is ein Ros entsprungen"—commonly translated as "Lo, how a rose e'er blooming"—is a Marian hymn referencing the Old Testament prophecies of Isaiah, which foretell Jesus' incarnation through the lineage of Jesse through the imagery of a tree. Composed by an unknown author around 1599, this tune has since been transformed by many composers over the centuries, always evoking a sense of peace and calm anticipation. Our introit consists of the first and third verses from the familiar harmonization by Michael Praetorious (1571–1621), while our communion music begins with an arrangement for handbells and flute.

"How Will We Know Him?" is a gentle song that raises many questions: How will we know the savior when he comes to earth? What form will he take? Will he be a king

with a mighty army? Or a tiny child with his mother? This anthem answers by highlighting the striking humbleness of the nativity, which honors gentleness over grandeur. Supported by a correspondingly simple piano accompaniment and flute obbligato, the melody and lyrics sung by our St. Philip children remind us that the greatest gift we can give is a loving heart.

The second of three installments from the Advent portion of Vivaldi's *Gloria* RV 589, today's **anthem** sets line two of the original 12th century hymn text and answers last week's anthem "Gloria to God in the highest" with "and on earth peace to people of good will." Contrary to the bright and joyful tone of the opening movement, Vivaldi chooses a slower brooding mood, using an incessant rhythmic accompaniment that supports a gradually evolving choral texture. To hear more of the emotion Vivaldi draws from this ancient Christian text, we hope you will join us for our St. Philip Christmas concert "Gloria!" this evening at 5:00 p.m.

Our **offertory** comes from Handel's oratorio *Judas Maccabeus*, written in 1746 as a compliment to the victorious British Prince William Augustus following a large battle in April of that year. While not the Handel oratorio most expect to hear this time of year, the duet from the third act finds an Israelite man and woman rejoicing that peace has finally come to their land. The underlying music contains many pastoral elements to reflect elements of text—hills, valleys, and fields of "wavy corn"—and a keen listener will hear musical similarities to the "pifa" or "pastoral symphony" from part 1 of Handel's Messiah, which depicts shepherds abiding in the fields.

### CAMPUS PLANNING UPDATE - DECEMBER 14

At 9:30 a.m. on **December 14** in the Dining Room, we will have another forum with updates on our campus planning process. This is essentially a repeat of the presentation from November 23. Earlier this year, the Session authorized an exploration of how to optimize our buildings and grounds to support our current and future ministry. The architectural firm English+Associates was engaged to lead this study. Among the topics considered was the current utilization of spaces across the church campus, maintenance costs, looming capital expenditures, operational efficiency, environmental sustainability, and security. As the architects studied these topics, they met regularly with our planning team (Dan Boston, John Hartman, John Lemen, Rhonda Sands, Peter Schneider, and John Wurster) and gathered information from the congregation via a summer survey. In response to expressed needs from the congregation, the plan seeks to preserve green space and developing more convenient parking. The Session received this report with a consensus that it should be shared with the congregation for review and comment. Please come and help us consider how best to use our resources in service to Jesus Christ.




