What does it mean to be a Veteran?

A veteran is a person who served in the active military, naval, air, or space service and was discharged or released under honorable conditions.

A Christian veteran is a Christian who has served in the military and is faithful to Jesus.

Here are some ways that Christians can exemplify their faith while serving in the military:

Value others

Christians should prioritize the needs of others and act in a just, merciful, and compassionate way.

Honor those they serve with

Christians should value the camaraderie and brotherhood that often exists among veterans and honor each other above themselves.

Be humble

Christians should walk humbly with God and reflect the character of Jesus Christ in all aspects of their lives.

Recognize the service of all.

Christians should honor all military branches and recognize the service of those who work in roles other than direct combat.

The word "veteran" comes from the Latin word veteranus, which means "old" or "of long experience". The first known use of the word was in 1509.

(**Big Idea**!) A veteran of the Christian Faith knows your relationship with God is the most important thing in your life, **THE MOST IMPORTANT THING IN YOUR LIFE**!

They deserve both recognition and honor.
