promise that, when God shows up, light breaks into darkness.

Given all these reminders, I invite you to see Advent this year as a journey. A journey to Bethlehem where we will meet at the manger to remember, to celebrate and to receive the greatest gift of our lives: Salvation through Emmanuel. God with us.

We cannot meet at the manger of Christ, fully ready for that miraculous moment, if we have not done the work of Advent.

Our Advent Worship theme will be "Meet Me at the Manger: A Journey to Christmas." Each week we will be walking with characters from the biblical Nativity story as we seek to understand our own faith in God through the eyes of these our biblical brothers and sisters.

The manger is far more than a pretty scene on a Christmas card, or a decoration we collect and set out in our homes. The manger is THE place where God chooses to meet us and reveal to us who God truly is — right in the middle of our journey, our ordinary lives, our cluttered hearts, our imperfect stories, and our fears, doubts and hopes — this is where God has chosen to show up.

If you look closely, the characters around this miraculous event — those who prepare the way, who say "yes" in faith, who are courageous in doing God's will, and who are committed to sharing in bold witness the message of Good News, and of course the One who lays in the manger to heal and change the world — these characters are our spiritual road map on this journey.

My prayer for us for this Advent is that we would slow down enough to notice the holy in the midst of the hurry. That we would listen for the quiet stirrings of God as we prepare, and that our hearts will be more open to the One who is always drawing near.

So come, join us as we journey to Christmas at Wells through this holy season. Meet me in hope, meet me in peace, meet me in joy, meet me in love, and meet me where God choses to meet the world, in a simple feeding trough of life-changing grace.

May this Advent season draw us deeper into the wonder of Christ's birth and the beauty of God's nearness in every part of our journey as we prepare to meet at the manger.

# **Long Awaited Advent**

How many times have you heard an adult lament the lost magic of the holidays? Or maybe you've felt it yourself — that longing to return to a time where all the Christmas season meant was stories around the fire, flipping through the gigantic Sears or JC Penny catalogue with a marker in hand, watching *The Grinch* and *A Charlie Brown Christmas*, decorating the tree, and seeing family members.

For many of us, it's a stark contrast to how we experience the holidays as adults. Do we still do most of those activities? Probably. But the added responsibilities and awareness that comes with age can too often dampen the excitement. As we enter the seasons of Advent and Christmas, I invite you to dig deeply and look broadly to rediscover that holiday wonder. We have four weeks between Thanksgiving and Christmas to

prepare our hearts and minds to joyfully remember and receive the gift of the Christ Child.

Let our weekly focus on Hope, Peace, Joy and Love help realign your focus on what truly matters this holiday season. May we let go of the worry and angst so that we can fully embrace the baby Jesus and the salvation we have in his promised coming!

The church year has a rhythm of seasons — some joyous, others more somber. The church year is complete — it covers the whole story of God's acting in human history. Advent is a time of preparation, a time to remember all the ways God has come to us and will come, a time to prepare ourselves — as well as our homes — for the glorious celebration of Christmas. It's a time of waiting and expectancy, a time of contemplation.

In the upcoming weeks at church, the service will begin with a family lighting the Advent wreath and sharing scripture and prayer to center all of our hearts on the anticipation of the season. If your family is in church in the weeks leading up to Christmas, allow your children to (carefully) examine the Advent wreath! What you'll see is four candles in the greenery itself and a large white candle in the center. But what do they mean?

The four candles in the wreath represent the four virtues Jesus brings us: Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. In many churches, ours included, a pink candle is used the third week to symbolize Joy. Each week of Advent, a new candle is lit and on Christmas Eve, after *much* waiting, the Christ candle is lit to symbolize the fulfillment of God's promise in the birth of Jesus Christ.

If you didn't get to attend our Advent Fair at the beginning of November, we still have copies of some great resources — Advent calendars, scripture chains, paper ornaments and a nativity shadow box. If you'd like any of these, please let me know!

May this season of Advent help us all to practice patience and find new ways to exemplify those Christ-like virtues of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love.
